Best float out of county was that of the Hermiton Chamber of Commerce, a \$15 prize winner. Decorated with Indian blankets, it showed a pioneer scene with a woman at a spinning wheel and a frontiersman with rifle at ready. Second in the division was the Umatilla Ordnance Depot float showing power for peace with a group eating happily under a shading canopy while guns on the front were ready for defense.

Umatilla Sage Riders won a \$25 prize as the best riding club and the Heppner Wranglers were second with a \$15 prize.

Best mounted family group, good for a \$7.50 prize was the Don Robinson family. Sherry Corley was judged best mounted cowgirl and won \$7.50. Roy Quackenbush was best mounted cowboy and received \$7.50.

Oldest cowgirl in the parade was Emma Cecil and she won \$5. Frank Parker received \$5 as the oldest cowboy, apparently shading the grand marshal, Frank Turner.

Ralph Beamer and Loy Harsin, with their frontier wedding scene—on horseback, no less, were judged best comics.

Ione High school won top prize for bands, \$15; and Heppner High school was second, getting \$10. Irrigon's Lions club won \$10 for first in the car entries.

Buck Lieuallen of Pendleton again captured first for surreys, completing the awards in the adult division.

4-H, FFA Stock Winners Receive Special Awards

Bidding was active and prices good at the annual 4-H and FFA livestock sale. Selling were 13 hogs, 19 sheep, 15 beef and 4 dairy heifers. Price for grand and reserve champion animals were down from last year. Sue Greenup's grand champion lamb sold for 50c compared to the 1963 price of 65c. Northwest Live-

stock Commission Company bought the grand champion again, as in 1963.

Reserve champion 4-H lamb sold for 45c to George Curran, grand champion FFA lamb shown by Jerry Greenup sold for 50c to Central Market while the reserve champion FFA shown by Tony Doherty went for 40c to Ione Builders Supply. Grand champion 4-H hog shown by Jim Bloodworth sold

for 40c to Billy Doherty, the reserve champion shown by Carl Spouse for 32c to Ekstrom Farm Chemicals. The 4-H grand champion beef, an 800 lb. choice Hereford, exhibited by Dale Van Blokland, sold for 50c a lb. to Morrow County Grain Growers who have bought the top animal at the fair for many years. The FFA grand champion, an 875 lb. choice Hereford, exhibited by Kenneth Wright, sold for 43c

to Central Market. Central Market also purchased the 4-H reserve champion steer, exhibited by Maureen Doherty, at 35c lb. Morrow County Grain Growers bought their second animal, the FFA reserve champion 1,000 lb. choice Hereford steer, shown by John Wagenblast for 36c. Terry Greenup sold a yearling Holstein heifer to Howard Keithley for \$150 while Dean Robinley sold a registered polled

Hereford, 3 months old bull calf, for \$150 to Dick Wilkinson. Don Wink of Northwest Livestock Commission and Gary Van Blokland, former 4-H member who recently graduated from auctioneer school, cried the sale. Support price of 24c for choice and 23c for good steers was made by Pacific Meat Company of Portland. Pacific Meat also supported hogs at 19c while Cohn Livestock Company, Hermiston, supported prime and choice lambs at 22c. Many of the animals went to slaughter for local lockers.
