

46 Mustang Gridders Out; 15 Veterans Back for '64 Play

If hard pre-season work is any criterion, Heppner High school will have a tough football team this season.

Forty-six players have been working out daily in stiff drills under the direction of their new coach, James Potter, since he arrived and started practices on Monday, August 24.

Potter comes from New Plymouth, Idaho, where he had four years coaching experience. Prior to that he was at New Meadows, Idaho, for two years. His basketball team won the Snake River Valley B league championship last year, and the new football program at New Plymouth developed from a turnout of 14 boys the first year to 62.

He will be assisted by Joe Hausler, who will handle the Jayvees. Hausler is starting his first year at Heppner High after teaching at Lone High.

Coach Potter, a graduate of the College of Idaho at Caldwell, states that he will use a multiple offense, combining a wing-T with a straight T and single wing.

Among the 46 men out are 15 lettermen. Although the team lacks speed in the backfield, the line should be tough this year. Backs are quick on the getaway but lack overall speed, he said.

Don Munkers, senior veteran, will be quarterback for the Mustangs, and he will be backed up by junior Gene Heliker and sophomore Jim Doherty.

Other lettermen back out are Stuart Dick, Tim Driscoll, both top performers last year, Simon Winter and Dean Robinson. Winter and Driscoll are juniors and Dick and Robinson are seniors.

In the way of tackles and guards, the coach has a strong contingent of lettermen, including David Hanna, Bruce Spencer, Frank Robinson, Lee Daggett, David Anderson and Paul Swagart, all seniors, and Jim Barclay and Mark Murray, juniors. Swagart was late in getting to practice because of an injury to his finger, but the coach said that he is back this week. Swagart also was out much of the season last year because of injury.

Larry Heath, senior, is a letterman back at the center position and two lettermen ends are Greg Pierce and Carl Bauman, both seniors.

Among top non-lettermen prospects noted so far by the coach are Jim Jacobs and Jim Doherty, both sophomore backs, and Stanley Rauch, sophomore linebacker.

Five Home Games On Grid Schedule

Five home games, three of them league contests, are on the football schedule for Heppner High school in the upcoming season.

Opener this year is just eight days away with Enterprise coming to furnish the first competition. Heppner, in a series over the past several years, is yet to conquer the Savages.

Enterprise will come here for the opener Friday night, September 11, at 8 p. m., and Coach Jim Potter's charges hope to change the trend of the previous seasons.

Another home game comes up for the Mustangs in the ensuing week, on September 18, when they will face Condon on the rodeo grounds here.

After traveling to Wasco county for a game on September 25, the Mustangs return to start their league season against Wahtonka here on the night of October 2. Second league game will be at home, against Grant Union at John Day on October 9, after which the Heppner gridders go to Pilot Rock for another counting tilt on October 16.

The Burns Islanders will travel to Heppner for an October 23 game, and the league season will conclude at Moro, against Sherman County, on October 30.

Season football tickets for Heppner High school are now on sale to the public at a bargain rate, according to Pete Glennie, athletic director. They may be obtained by telephoning the school.

The tickets sell for \$4 for the five home games, starting with the Enterprise game here September 11. A special section in the grandstand will be reserved for season ticket holders.

Normal admission is \$1 per game, so season ticket holders will get a reduction of 30c per contest.

Glennie said that the Heppner side of the field will be policed this year so that none but football players will be allowed on the sidelines, thus making it easier for the public to see from the stands. Those who wish to go up and down the sidelines will be asked to go to the other side of the field so as not to obscure view from the stands.

Board Requests Impartial Help On Site Choice

Board of directors of Morrow County School District R-1 at a special meeting Monday night authorized Supt. David Potter to engage professional help of a qualified firm to make an impartial study of facts needed in choosing a site for the new Riverside High school.

Dr. Frank Bennett, retired president of Eastern Oregon College who has spent a lifetime in education, was present at the meeting in a counseling capacity and concurred in the recommendation of Supt. Potter that the survey be made.

For several years, Boardman and Irrigon have been competing for the school site. Riverside High is now located at Boardman.

Supt. Potter presented a proposed outline to guide the firm in making its study. Included are the following points:

1. Survey Boardman facilities—present school program, future school program, Boardman future school site (district owned), and anticipated growth of Boardman.
2. Interview Boardman mayor, city council, planning commission, and sampling of population.
3. Survey Irrigon facilities—present school program, future school program, Irrigon school site, proposed addition to school site, anticipated growth of Irrigon.
4. Interview Irrigon mayor, city council, planning commission, sampling of population.
5. Interview members of Corps of Engineers who are directly connected with this project.
6. Interview executives of Boeing who are directly connected with the Boeing project in Morrow county.
7. Study the entire economy of Morrow county, with emphasis on the Boardman-Irrigon areas.
8. Interview all Morrow county school board members.
9. Interview Morrow county school administrators with respect to total future school programs.
10. Interview State Planning Commission representative.
11. Consult with State Department of Education, including schoolhouse planning section and the division of instruction.
