Miss Zimmerman Gets Peace Corps Assignment in India

Bonnie G. Zimmerman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Zimmerman, Hermiston, and granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orlan Wright, Heppner, has been accepted into the U. S. Peace Corps and left Oregon this week for overseas assignment, according to word received last week by news release to her grandparents.

After graduating from Hermiston High school, Miss Zimmerman completed one year of college at Oregon State University.

She was to depart September 9 for India with 32 other Peace Corps volunteers. They will join about 145 other volunteers already at work in agricultural extension, rural community action, secondary education and health. By developing irrigation works, poultry and dairy projects these new volunteers will assist in providing better food for the Indian state of West Bengal.

As part of its development plan, the Indian government has requested Peace Corps Volunteers to extend the work of state poultry farms on the village level. The volunteers will instruct and demonstrate improved techniques of poultry development, such as chicken coop construction, proper feeding and disease control. They will also help develop better methods to market the chickens and eggs produced.

The group trained for 10 weeks at the University of California at Davis. Instruction was practical, emphasizing training in agricultural methods and Bengali, the language of West Bengal. The trainees attended courses on Indian history, culture and local traditions as well as reviewing courses on American history and institutions, and world affairs.

The departing volunteers will join the 6,000 other Americans now working for the Peace Corps in 46 African, Asian and Latin American countries, with requests received daily from these nations for additional Volunteers.
