Death Claims Fred Hoskins Sr. In Pendleton

Fred J. Hoskins, 69, stockman in Morrow county since 1925, died Sunday, September 6, in a Pendleton hospital.

Funeral services were Wednesday at 2 p.m. in the Heppner Christian church with the Rev. Earl Soward, pastor of the Lexington Christian church, officiating.

Interment was in Heppner Masonic cemetery.

Mr. Hoskins had been a stockman in Umatilla county, at Stanfield, before coming to Morrow county, and raised sheep most of his life.

As a young man he was an outstanding athlete, both in basketball and football, and maintained a lifelong interest in sports.

He was born March 22, 1895, at Pine City, attended public school there and in Echo before going to Pendleton High school. At Pendleton High, where he graduated 51 years ago, he was a member of the state championship football team.

At Echo he later played basketball as a member of a town team, "The Purple Giants," which held an impressive record over all opposition.

On December 21, 1916, he was married to Mary A. Corrigal, and they made their home in Stanfield before moving to Rhea Creek in 1925 where they have lived since.

Mr. Hoskins was a member of the Heppner Elks Lodge for more than 40 years.

Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Mary Hoskins; two sons, Fred Jr. of Heppner and Robert of Ione; two sisters, Mrs. Vashti King, Pendleton, and Mrs. Mary Foley, Echo; three brothers, Ben of Umapine, and James and Will, both of Pilot Rock, and five grandchildren.

Sweeney Mortuary, Heppner, had charge of arrangements.
