## Criminal Cases Bring True Bills From Grand Jury

Morrow county's grand jury returned several true bills on criminal cases Friday. One defendant was arraigned the same day in circuit court of Judge William Wells, and others will be arraigned Tuesday, September 22.

Sheriff C. J. D. Bauman said that the county currently has nine men in jail, some of whom are in the Umatilla county jail and several in the Rocky Butte jail in Portland.

Neil Edwin Welbrink, former employee of Rogers Construction Co., Boardman, is charged with obtaining money under false pretenses in one indictment. He is accused of passing a bad check in Ione. Welbrink was arraigned in circuit court Friday and bail was set at \$1500. He is held in the Umatilla county jail in lieu of posting bail. Trial is scheduled for Tuesday. James Walton, Pendleton, was appointed as defense counsel.

Charges of larceny from a person face two men, Ivan C. Hansen and Lamore Anderson, both of Hermiston, who allegedly took some \$400 from Wilbur Hinkle of Hermiston in a Boardman restaurant. The two, indicted by the grand jury, are to be arraigned Tuesday in circuit court. Bail was set at \$2500 each and they are held in lieu of posting bail. Bob Abrams of Heppner was appointed as their counsel.

Alfred Dwight Worley, charged with burglary not in a dwelling, will enter plea Tuesday in circuit court. He currently is free after posting \$1500 bail. Worley is accused of taking grain from the elevator at Patterson Ferry landing recently.

An indictment returned in 1962, after which a bench warrant was issued, resulted in the apprehension of Lee Roy McDuffee on a charge of forgery. Sheriff Bauman said. He was arrested in Walla Walla on another charge and was held for Morrow county on the old indictment. The warrant was issued at a time when McDuffee was selling magazines in Morrow county. He is in the Umatilla county jail in lieu of posting \$2500 bail. Attorney Walton has been named as his defense counsel.

Trial of Jim Valentine, which was scheduled for September 10 in Morrow county circuit court, was postponed because he is confined to a hospital in Pendleton.

## Irrigon Council Works on Street Improvement Plan

IRRIGON—At the September council meeting, Mayor Chester Wilson reported on the special meeting held August 20 concerning street improvement within the City of Irrigon. He stated it was the desire of the majority present to prepare some of the existing graveled roads for surfacing, to be accomplished next spring, rather than to resurface the presently oiled roads. The council discussed the possibilities of appointing a street committee, whose function would be to study the street situation and arrange for a long-range program that would eventually provide for all the streets to be surfaced.

In other council business, it was announced that the Landfill Commission, comprised of representatives of the 5 participating groups, City of Irrigon and outlying community, City of Umatilla and outlying community and City of McNary, had proposed fencing the landfill and making a charge for everyone making use of it. Rather than favoring this plan, the Irrigon Council endorsed an alternate plan which would permit the landfill to be fenced, in order to have some control to bring it up to state standards, but specified the landfill should be open to the public free of charge, on specified days of the week. It was the feeling of the council that if a charge was imposed on everyone dumping refuse, that the city should not contribute towards the expense of maintaining the landfill, as they now do.

The terms of three council members will expire this year, and anyone desiring to run for the council may obtain a petition at the Post Office, secure at least 20 signatures of legal voters, complete the certification of the circulator of the petition and the acceptance of the candidate and give to the City Recorder, Mrs. Margeurite Houghton, at least 10 days prior to the election to be conducted with the general election in November. The terms expiring are those of Mrs. Louis Shade, and Mrs. Ernest Jorgensen and Donald Adams.

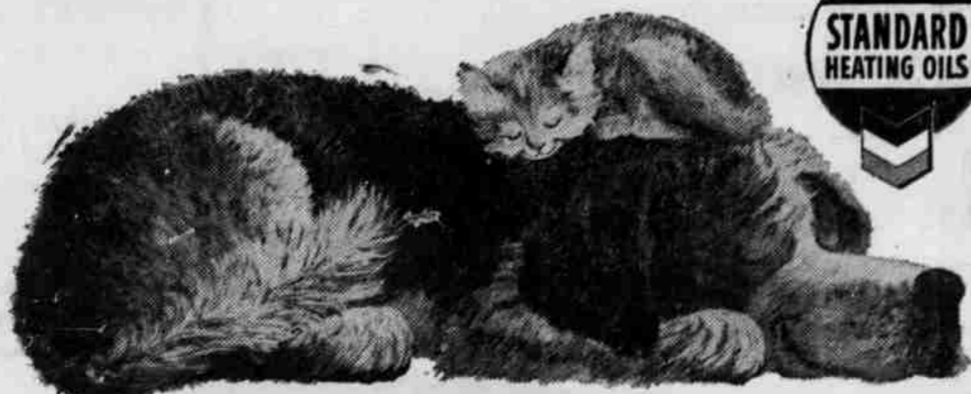
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
