

Savages' Passing Drops Heppner in Opener

Throwing a potent passing attack at the Heppner High football eleven, the Enterprise Savages won their fourth opening game in a row over the Mustangs by a shutout, 12-0, on the rodeo grounds here Friday night.

Even though on the short end, the Heppner gridders made the best showing in the series to date, since previous openers were by scores of 27-0, 20-0 and 20-0.

The losers gave up both the touchdowns in the first half and then settled down to outgain Enterprise in the second half, each team holding the other scoreless after intermission.

Jim Strohm snagged the long passes that brought touchdowns for the victors, one in the first quarter and the other in the second period. Coach Jim Potter's lads were caught a little by surprise with the polished passing of the visitors, and by the time they got to work in defending it, the damage had been done.

Coach Potter said that the Mustangs hadn't drilled to oppose a spread formation such as Enterprise used, but he added, "We'll be ready hereafter."

Several bad breaks or miscues hurt the Mustang cause early in the ball game. First was a blocked punt that gave the visitors the ball on Heppner's 28. They completed one long pass that put them in scoring territory, but the Mustangs gained a reprieve on a 15-yard penalty.

A second costly play came a few minutes later when the Heppner team was rolling on offense. Through a mixup in signals, the ball was snapped from center and went rolling free on the turf. The Mustangs recovered but at a costly loss which set them back on their heels.

Again in the Savages on third down as the visitors were moving, but a 5-yard offside penalty gave Enterprise a first down and paved the way for their second touchdown.

Behind the signal calling of Don Munkers, quarterback, and good ground gaining efforts of Stuart Dick, Dean Robinson and Tim Driscoll, the Heppner team, crunched down field on a sustained drive in the second quarter, yard by yard. On a fourth down play, as they moved into Enterprise territory, the pass was blocked and the referee appeared obviously so to the crowd and the coaches, at least. The ball carrier carried well over 100 yards.

This year the team will be composed strictly of freshmen and sophomores, and at the present time Coach Hausler has 22 on his squad. A heavy majority of all freshmen boys in the high school turned out for the squad.

"Our junior high athletic program is starting to pay off," Glennie said.

On September 28 they will play the John Day Jayvees on the rodeo grounds here at 3:30 and on October 5, also a Monday, they will be host to Pilot Rock's young Rockets in a game under the lights at 7 p.m.

They will finish the season with two games away from home—against Umatilla on Monday, October 12, at 3:30 and against John Day on Monday, October 26, also at 3:30.

Halvorsen opened the scoring with a run and by halftime, the Cards led, 12 to 0. They scored once more and made the point, leading 19 to 0, when Dufur's passing attack went into action and they reached paydirt on a pass, making the count 19 to 7 in the third quarter.

The Cards' ground game kept rolling in the fourth quarter when they tallied two more touchdowns with the conversion points.

Coach Gordon Meyers was well pleased with his team's play. "For the amount of time they have had to practice, they showed real well," he said.

He had fine words for the work of Monte Crum, center, John McElligott, guard, and Stan Holstein, end. Singled out as defensive standouts were Leon and Leland Magill, both of whom played a strong game.

"All the backs played a tremendous game," he said. In addition to the running of Mark Halvorsen and Baker, he cited Jay Ball and Joe Halvorsen, both of whom did outstanding work on blocking, and he felt that Mark called an excellent game from the quarterback spot.

Several of lone's touchdowns were on long runs, but most of the ground gaining was on shorter carries. Dufur was pretty well stopped on the ground but connected on several passes.

lone now draws a rest, but will jump right into league action next week when the team goes to Weston on Friday, September 25, for a 2 p. m. battle.
