

Irrigon Landfill Commission Sets Dumping Policy

IRRIGON — The community Landfill Commission at a special meeting last Tuesday night, took definite action regarding future policy for the Irrigon Landfill. After two weeks of advertising, the gates will be locked, and it is proposed that they will be open for use on Wednesday and Saturday, with a charge being made to all using the landfill, and an attendant present while gates are open.

The following schedule of rates will be used: 40¢ for dumping a garbage can; 50¢ minimum for others; 70¢ for dumping a burning barrel; \$1.00 per cubic yard for all other. An accurate account of the operation is to be kept by the operator and submitted to the commission, with adjustment being made at the year's end.

Andy Skiles, who is chairman of the commission, noted that this action was necessary due to excessive dumping of garbage by residents and business outside of the assessed areas, and it is anticipated that this move will give a more suitable control and that a more sanitary operation may be maintained.
