Because of her educational background and broad experience in child development and family life, Mrs. Steinmetz is an extremely interesting and enlightening speaker, PTA leaders state.

She has studied at the University of Puget Sound, Oregon State University, and Colorado State College, with additional work for television at Michigan State, and workshops at the University of Chicago, under the Ford Foundation, on parenthood in a free nation and at Iowa State in child development.

At OSU she taught classes in family relations, was an extension specialist in child development and family life, and served as dean of women for eight years. During World War II, she was given a year's leave for a wartime atomic project at Hanford under the DuPont Company, where she held the highest woman's job, "A sort of dean of women." 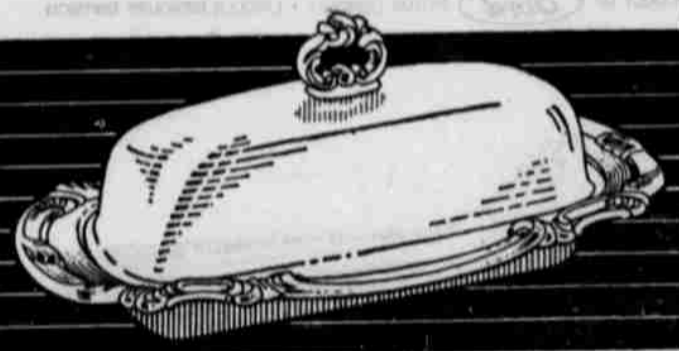
