

## Boardman Census On Steady Climb

BOARDMAN—The city of Boardman now has a population of 381 as announced September 22 by the Oregon State Board of Census. This is an increase of 146 over the last count of 235 a few months ago. This does not include residents of a trailer court adjoining town that is not included in the city limits. There are an estimated 100 persons living there. There will be another census taken in December.

The Boardman City Council approved the second contract with the U. S. Corps of Engineers at a meeting Tuesday night of last week. This calls for construction of public structures and facilities, which includes the city hall, fire station, park and boat launching ramp.

## Follow-up Study On Cancer Slated

The 5th annual follow-up in the American Cancer Society's cancer prevention study has started in Morrow County.

Ten volunteers in the county will again report on whether the 180 men and women they enrolled in the study in the fall of 1959, are alive or dead. Nationwide, according to Mrs. Marian McCurdy Jr., Heppner, chairman, the study covers more than 1,000,000 people in 1,121 counties in the United States. In 1959, these persons furnished many details about themselves and their pattern of life. They filled out questionnaires answering 250 carefully framed

questions that might lead to determining if those who develop cancer differ in some ways from those who don't, with respect to environment, habits, exposures, and way of life.

Valuable information has already emerged from the study. After two follow-ups, a preliminary analysis confirmed that certain danger signals had a high relationship to deaths for specific sites of cancer.
