

## Tim Smith Wins In Cross Country

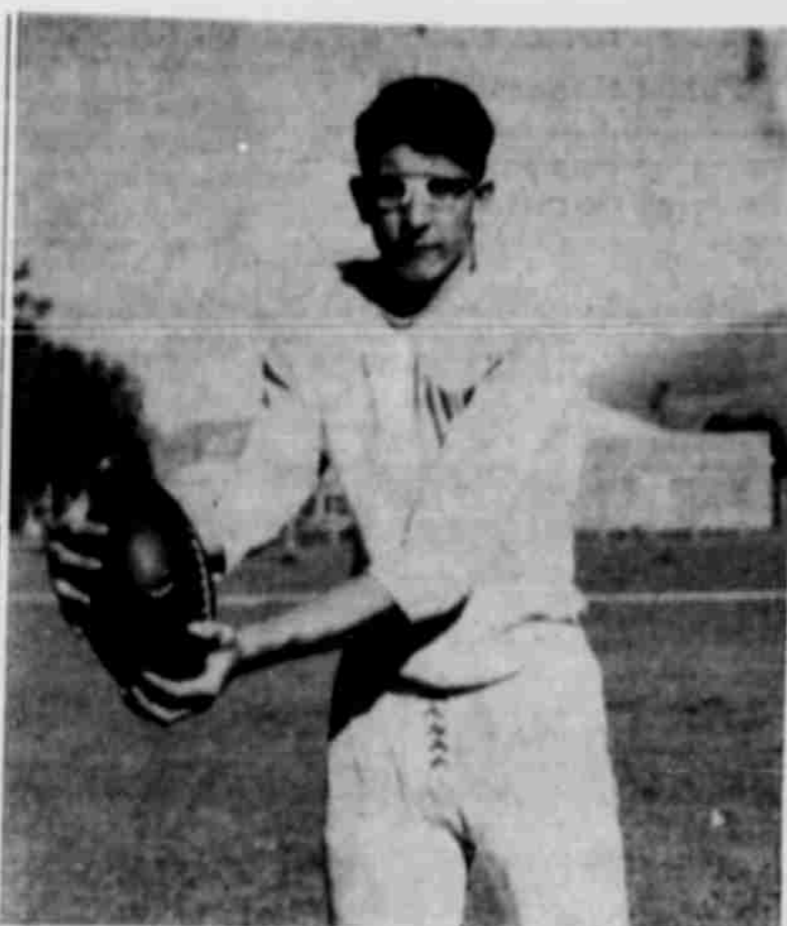

## J. Troedson, 86, Dies After Short Hospital Illness

Johan Troedson, 86, an early Morrow county pioneer, died in the Pioneer Memorial hospital Wednesday morning, October 14, after a short illness. He had not been feeling well at his home in lone last week and had entered the hospital Friday, showing apparent improvement early this week.

Funeral services will be held Saturday, October 17, at 2 p.m. at the lone United Church of Christ. Rev. Kenneth Robinson will officiate, with interment in Highview Cemetery, lone. Memorial contributions are being accepted to Valby Lutheran Memorial Fund or to the lone United Church of Christ.

Mr. Troedson was born in Sweden, County Skane, on May 8, 1878. He immigrated to America on April 2, 1896, spending two years in California, then coming to Morrow county in April of 1898. Here he homesteaded in the Ella area near lone, which was his home for over 40 years. He retired about 20 years ago and moved to lone, where he had since made his home.

On February 21, 1901, he was married to Thilda Nelson in San Francisco, Calif. She preceded him in death on June 14, 1955.

Mr. Troedson was a member of Valby Lutheran church and of Heppner Elks Lodge No. 358, and always actively interested in community affairs.

Surviving are three sons, Carl and Verner, both of lone, and Francis of Portland, and one daughter, Mrs. Howard (Linea) Nottage, also of Portland.

## Mustangs Tumble Grant For Homecoming Win

Grant Union's Prospectors came closer to spoiling Heppner High's homecoming on the football field Friday night than their final score, 20 to 7 in the Mustangs' favor, indicated.

Made exciting by long runs, fumbles and intercepted passes, the contest was a thriller for the homecoming crowd, but the John Day lads put up a scrap that kept them in contention all the way.

Two long runs by Tim Driscoll in the first half, however, gave the home town team a lead that the Prospectors could never match.

A Prospector fumble paved the way to the first Heppner touchdown. It came within the first couple of minutes of play. With the ball in John Day territory after a Grant Union gridders had muffed a catch of the kickoff and it was recovered by Heppner, Driscoll took the ball on the second carry, boomed through and romped 35 yards to pay dirt. Gene Heliker ran the extra point.

In the second quarter Driscoll got loose again and scampered 40 yards to score. Try for point on this one failed.

At one point, Grant Union was held within the Heppner one-yard line in the first half and had to give up the ball.

The visitors' only score came when their scatback, Tom Grimsley, took the kickoff after Heppner's second touchdown, and ran it back from his own 10-yard stripe, going straight

down the center of the field, aided by some good blocking. Stuart Dick made a great effort at nailing him, surging from the rear, but tackled the Prospector just as he hit the goal line.

Grimsley made the point on a kick that barely cleared the crossbar, and at halftime it was 13-7.

For Heppner in the second half, it was a case of hanging on and holding what it had. Grant Union had possession of the ball throughout much of the half, often deep in Heppner territory, allowing the Mustangs only seven plays from scrimmage after intermission.

One break provided an insurance touchdown in the third when Jim Doherty, sophomore, was Johnny-on-the-spot to pick up a Prospector fumble near the 50-yard stripe. The ball hit the ground, Doherty picked it up, hesitated a moment, and then headed goalward. Some of the visitors gave pursuit but Doherty wasn't to be denied. He went the distance for six points. Carl Bauman caught a pass for the extra point, and the score held at 20-7 through the remainder of the contest.

Coach Jim Potter confessed that he wasn't very happy with his team in this one because of their bad case of fumbling, a malady fortunately shared by the Prospectors. The boys weren't able to defend the John Day lads as good as they did Wahatoka.

The two teams were about equal in yardage gained, Heppner making 192 on 154 rushing and 38 passing, and John Day getting 184 on 127 rushing and 57 passing.

No statistics were available on the number of first downs, but Coach Potter said he believed John Day had the edge. In the second half Heppner fumbled the ball five times on first down to lose possession.

Nevertheless, they won the game and remained tied with Burns at the top of the Greater Oregon standings with a 2-0 record.

## Mann Emphasizes Area Importance

Irvin Mann, Jr., candidate for representative from the 28th legislative district, told an audience of Pendleton Kiwanis members last week that with two-thirds of the area of Oregon lying east of the Cascade Mountains represented by 13% of the voting strength in the state, House of Representatives salesmanship becomes an important part of representing the district.
