

Mann Proposes Citizen Tax Study

Irvin Mann, Jr., candidate for the legislature from the 28th district, speaking before the Mikkalo Farm Bureau and guests last week, endorsed a proposal for a continuing citizen's tax study committee to work full time between legislative sessions on Oregon's tax structure.

"Such a committee, composed of able, reasonable leaders of a broad cross-section of the interests of the state might accomplish two things," Mann said. "They might be able to determine with accuracy what type of base broadening general fund tax the people would find acceptable, and they could conduct a continuous program of public education on taxation."

Mann added that the creation, appointment and functioning of such a committee might be long overdue.

Mission Speaker Stirs Audience Of Association

Dr. Richard C. Braun was the featured speaker at the Mid-Columbia Association of the Oregon Conference of the United Church of Christ, which was held at the Ione United Church of Christ on October 14 and 15.

Dr. Braun is a medical missionary, who has served six years in Ghana, Africa, and is now on six months furlough with his wife and four children in this country. He is medical superintendent of the mission hospital at Addome, Ghana, a rural village on the Volta River about 65 miles from the capital city of Accra.

He spoke at the Wednesday evening service highlighting his talk with beautiful slides of Ghana, a country about the size of Oregon populated with over seven million people. About 23 percent of the citizens are Christians, but Dr. Braun and his associates have about 500 patients a day coming to the hospital for treatment. Dr. Braun said the people of Ghana are very grateful for the aid the churches of the United States give them in food, clothing, and financial assistance. They are accepting aid from both pro-Western and Communist countries, but try to remain independent of any other country. Dr. Braun expressed appreciation for the work the Peace Corp members were doing for the Ghanians.

Representatives were present from Enterprise, Milton-Freewater, Condon, Primeville, Pendleton, The Dalles, and Ione. Dr. A. J. Buttrey, Conference Minister, Mrs. Buttrey, and Miss Ruth Bailey, director of Christian Education for the Oregon Conference, from Portland also attended. Dr. Buttrey and Miss Bailey reported on the work being done in the conference. A Christian Education Workshop was set up to be held in Pendleton on November 9.

Robert Jepsen, Ione, a member of the Commission on Stewardship and Missions, showed slides of the work of Christian World Missions in Oregon and throughout the world. This was narrated by Mrs. Jepsen.

The Rev. Fred Morrow, The Dalles, was moderator for the Funeral Practices Forum. Bruce Mercer, Condon, and Rev. James Halfaker, Milton-Freewater, presented views on funerals from a layman's and a minister's standpoint. A discussion followed in which different views were expressed and particularly in regard to contributions being made to memorials instead of for flowers at funerals. Visitors from Heppner, including Jerry Sweeney, attended the forum.

Thursday morning the association members on the conference commissions presented some of the accomplishments and goals of their respective commissions.

The Rev. Halfaker presided over the business session. Officers elected for the coming year are: Harlan J. Devin, Condon, moderator; the Rev. James Jones, Enterprise, vice-moderator; Mrs. E. Markham Baker, Ione, scribe-registrar-treasurer; and Mrs. Bruce Mercer, Condon, commission of lay life and work. The Mid-Columbia Association will hold the next meeting in Condon in October, 1965.
