Mustangs Battle To 12-0 Victory Over Pilot Rock

Gridmen of Heppner High ground out a tough 12-0 victory over the Pilot Rock high team on the Rockets' field Friday night in a defensive battle between the two Greater Oregon teams.

Both teams were stubborn on defense, and each found the going tough on offense. While the Mustangs were able to roll up quite a rushing advantage, they had a hard time putting the ball across the enemy goal line.

At halftime the scoreboard showed a blank for each team, 0-0, and it was Tim Driscoll who came through with a touchdown in each of the post-intermission periods to net triumph for the Heppner team.

In each case he scored from about five yards out. In the course of the evening, Driscoll rolled up 102 yards, being by far the leading ground gainer of the night. He averaged 5.6 yards per carry. Heppner's total rushing was 178 yards, with 32 more being added from passes. Gene Heliker connected on three.

Heppner statisticians showed that the Rockets made only a net gain of nine yards for the night, together with 24 from passing for a total of 33. Rocket statisticians show their total at 69 net yards.

Coach Jim Potter said that his team was the best on defense that it has been all year. The Rockets never threatened to dent the Heppner end zone, and it was a grinding game with no long runs nor passes.

Heppner had one touchdown called back on a clipping penalty. Jay Ball showed the top defensive effort with nine tackles and Greg Pierce was second with seven.

Ione Faces Echo; Riverside Downs Cardinals, 39-7

Ione High's football team, whose season was started again Friday when they suffered a 39-7 defeat by Riverside after being idle for three weeks, will face the Echo High 8-man football team at Ione Friday at 2 p.m.

The Cards have now lost to Weston and Riverside, after beating non-league Dufur, Umapine and Helix forfeited games to them when they could not field squads.

Riverside's victory Friday was their sixth of the season and fourth in league play. After scoring twice in the first quarter and once in the second, Riverside held a 20-0 lead at halftime. Ione scored in the third quarter when Joe Halvorsen plunged over from the one-yard line after a long pass play.

The victors added two touchdowns in the third period and finished with one in the fourth. Dennis Anderson, Steve Partlow, Jim Partlow, Terry McCoy and Lyle Hobbs played leading scoring roles for the victors.

WHEREAS, the proposed district would have the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at the intersection of the West line of Section 19 Township 5 North R. 26 E.W.M. and the Columbia River thence East along the Columbia River to the East line of Section 16 in Township 5 North Range 27 E.W.M.; thence South nine and one-half miles to the Southeast corner of Section 33 in Township 4 North Range 27, East; thence West nine miles to the Southwest corner of Section 31 in Township 4 North Range 26 E.W.M.; thence North eight and one-fourth miles to place of beginning, and

WHEREAS, a notice of hearing has been duly published in a newspaper of general circulation within Morrow County and,

WHEREAS, said hearings have been held, and now therefore,

IT IS HEREBY ORDERED, that an election for the establishment of the proposed Park and Recreation Maintenance District be held on November 3, 1964 and at such election, three members of the Park and Recreation Board will be voted for.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED AND ADJUDGED that this order shall be entered in the Journal of the County Court along with all petitions and papers filed pursuant to the formation of this proposed District.

Notice is given that the Council of the City of Boardman, Oregon, having elected to dispense with the submission of the question to the registered voters of the City of Boardman, will, by virtue of Resolution No. 22 of the Council passed on October 6, 1964, hold a public hearing on the 27th day of October, 1964, at the hour of 8:00 p.m., Daylight Saving Time in the Council Chambers of the City Hall, of the City of Boardman, Oregon, on the question of the proposed annexation of the following described area to the City of Boardman, Oregon:


