Guest speaker for the meeting was William Rawlins, who gave an instructive talk on dahlia care, including stages from cutting to storage. After digging, he recommends washing the tubers thoroughly, letting them dry and cure for about three days, divide them and prepare them for storing. A dusting with sulphur on the cut areas helps check root rot, and he has found storing them in plastic bags at a 45 degree temperature is recommended in this climate.
