### Four Take Part In Spokane Meet

Taking part from this area at the 1964 sessions of the North Pacific Grain Growers annual convention in the Ridpath hotel at Spokane Thursday and Friday are Al Lamb, manager of the Morrow County Grain Growers, Harlan McCurdy, assistant manager, Paul W. Jones, president and Glen Aylsworth, Condon Grain Growers manager. Jones is a director of North Pacific.

Problems now facing the 22,000 grower members of the 52 local cooperatives, affiliated with NPGG throughout the three-state regions of Oregon, Washington and Idaho, created by the changing patterns in grain handling, marketing and transportation, will be among the prime topics discussed by nationally known experts in the industry.

W. A. (Dick) Richards, general manager of NPGG, will report to the convention that the association in 1964 has handled its largest grain volume of any previous comparative period in its 35-year history.

### Measure 3 Would Hurt Farmers, Speaker States

If measure 3, the State Compulsory Workmen's Compensation bill, is passed at the general election, farmers will pay \$12.40 per \$100 of payroll for the state accident insurance, Irvin Luiten of the Weyerhaeuser company told the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce Monday.

There would be some exceptions among farmers, but the bill would catch any farm of any size, the speaker said.

Appearing on behalf of the Committee for Fair Workmen's Compensation, Luiten pointed out that employers who have been carrying private insurance or who have been self-insured would have to take the state insurance under the bill's provisions.

When they start under the state plan, if the bill passes, they will have to pay the base premium rate for at least two years, regardless of the occupation.

In terms of the logging operations of the Weyerhaeuser company, the firm would have to pay the base rate of \$11.30 per \$100 payroll for its eastern Oregon operations for two years as compared with the present \$1.60 per \$100 that it now has under its own insurance plan. For operations in western Oregon, the company would have to pay \$16.00 as compared with its present \$3.80. Similar figures would be true for other companies which have insured privately or carried their own insurance, he said.

Any employer insuring for the first time with the state would have to pay the base premium rate, regardless of its insurance history.

Luiten said that the state wants new industry. "I don't think this will attract industry," he declared. The bill creates a complete state monopoly and includes every employer with one or more employees. It increases benefits 18%, and Luiten said he felt that such an increase is needed. However, he said that a bill in the last legislature which had been worked out by labor and employers, as well as an advisory committee, would have increased the benefits.

The bill failed because a minority group of labor opposed it at the last minute after it had passed the senate, Luiten said. Thus, the increase was in a bill that "labor defeated itself."

The legislative bill would have put state supervision over all employers, but they would have had a choice on buying insurance, whether through the state, a private company or through self-insurance. The state would have set up specific benefits for all, and employees not satisfied with settlements would have recourse of suing the state, rather than the employer.

As now operative, employers may choose to reject the state act and insure privately or self-insure.

Domestic labor would be included in certain instances and stiff penalties would be imposed for violations, he said.

Luiten said that he feels that the measure would accomplish some benefits, but called it an "extreme measure."

It includes 60,000 words, but the ballot title is only 25 words, hardly enough for the voter to comprehend its provisions, he pointed out. It would repeal 21 current laws and amend 16 others.

Average time of payment to the workman undoubtedly would go up under the state monopoly, he said. In Weyerhaeuser's Washington operations, which are under compulsory state insurance there, average time of payment to injured workmen is 33 days. In Oregon, under their own plan, payment never takes longer than 15 days, he said.
