Governor Scores 'Moral Erosion' In Heppner Talk

(Continued from page 1) of imports to Oregon. Its findings would be a basis for protests and recommendations to the federal government.

Control on imports at the federal level is now done by the State Department and is being used to further political objectives, the governor said.

"We lost \$13 million in Oregon alone in 1963," he said, "and the basic cause was the import 'ade policies of the U. S. government."

At the same time, he declared, "I am not one to look on the Federal government as an enemy, but I feel we must constantly remind it of such things as state and county governments."

The governor spoke highly of local, district and state Republican candidates, saying that Giles French, candidate for senator, was one of the most influential men in the House during his service there; that Irvin Mann is the "type of man we need"; that Howard Belton, state treasurer, is one of the "most dedicated men in public service"; that Tom McCall has an "outstanding background" and knows Central and Eastern Oregon; and that in Merlin Estep, Oregonians have opportunity of electing an attorney to the position of attorney-general.

"Mr. Estep has shown that he can make a living practicing law," the governor said.

"Oregonians are pretty capable of making decisions impartially on the basis of the best candidate," he stated and also pointed out that Morrow county has the best voting Republicans in the state with 84.3% turning out at the primary election.

On the sparse population and light voting strength in this part of the state, he said, "Twelve people overturned the world (Jesus disciples). Don't let your light registration bother you."

Don Turner, Morrow county Republican central committee chairman, was toastmaster at the breakfast and introduced local Republican candidates.

Pre-Registration Urged for Merit Qualifying Test

All 1966 graduates of Heppner High school who wish to enter the 1965-66 National Merit Scholarship competition should register now at the school office, Gordon Pratt, principal, has announced.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying test will be given in the school at 9 a.m., Saturday, March 13, 1965. To receive consideration, the student must take the test at this time, with the paying of a \$1 fee.

Students who will complete secondary school in 1966 and enter college in the same calendar year are eligible for scholarship consideration in the 1965-66 Merit Program. Merit scholarships are four-year awards. The extent of a winner's financial need determines the amount of his stipend.

A student's performance on the qualifying test also provides him with information that is useful in career planning or in selecting courses in high school.

It is designed to help students understand their individual test results, to make comparisons with scores of high school students across the country, and to use this information in making educational and vocational plans. Thus, Mr. Pratt

said, students can learn more about their educational strengths and weaknesses, whether or not they plan to attend college.

In addition to the merit awards, about 230 business corporations, foundations, colleges, professional associations and individuals give scholarships through the Merit Program. A considerable number of other scholarship agencies utilize the services in awarding their scholarships.
