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served steak twice a week and pot roasts once each week. It takes 12 minutes to properly prepare a steak in the infra-red, conveyor-belted broiler in the galley. Steaks roll through the broiler in a constant stream so that in 45 minutes, 4,000 steaks are ready and waiting for the Midshipmen to attend chow.

A roast or steak serving averages 1 1/2 pounds per man. Multiply this by the number of Midshipmen, and almost a ton of beef is packed away each time the Brigade sits down to eat. Sections are not unheard of (particularly during football season), and a total of 2,100 pounds of beef will disappear at a good steak dinner.

When hamburgers are featured, 10,000-18,000 pounds of meat will be accounted for. And even meatball and spaghetti meals will provide the Midshipmen with 12,000 pounds of U.S.D.A. inspected beef. More than 1/2 million pounds of fresh beef are consumed each year at Annapolis—544,000 pounds, to be exact!

New-Type Loan Available For Aiding College Students
A number of Production Credit Associations are now offering

new-type loans for college students. In the Eastern area, students may apply for the loans themselves if they are sponsored by financially responsible adults. Loans cover tuition, room and board, books and all costs incidental to education regardless of courses chosen or future vocations.

While we have not heard of any of our local PCA's providing these loans, those who have offered them include a seven year repayment plan, a four year plan with refinancing option, and a plan in which the students pay back 25% of the principal by working during the summer.

Anderson Adds Breeding Stock

Frank Anderson, local Hereford breeder looking to present and future demands for Hereford breeding cattle, especially bulls, has taken another step forward. Frank has, over the years, tried to keep in tune with breeder demand in the type of Herefords that he has bred.

He recently returned from the Weiss Hereford Ranch in Iowa where he purchased a herd sire of Intense Domino and Husker Mischief breeding to use in his herd. He also purchased seven heifers carrying this breeding which will become a part of his herd.

Farmers To Be Contacted During Agricultural Census

Questionnaires for the 1964 Census of Agriculture are now being mailed to Morrow county ranchers. The forms are expected to reach all of our ranchers within the next few days. This will allow ranchers a period of time to consult their 1964 business records in order to answer questions on the forms before census enumerators begin calling on the farms to collect the forms. Best estimates for the year will be sufficient to answer questions in cases where complete records for the year are not available yet.

The visits by enumerators is scheduled to start on November 9 in this county. Enumerators will call on every rancher. At the time of the call he will help the farmer complete answers to all questions in the form that the farmer was unable to answer and will review the forms to see that it is completely filled out. The Census of Agriculture is taken every 5 years. This is to gather up-to-date information on U. S. Agricultural resources and production.

Bureau Approval On Resolutions Given at Meeting

Morrow County Farm Bureau met Wednesday, October 28, at the Don Heliker home to consider and vote on tentative resolutions to be presented at the annual meeting of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, which is to be held in Grants Pass on November 9-11.

In the field of education they approved resolutions calling for nomination of directors for board members from each zone in administrative districts; amending ORS 332.010 to allow out of state travel for school board members at district expense, when such travel is deemed necessary by local school boards; and opposing legislation requiring mandatory reorganization or unification of high school and elementary school districts.

Resolutions on taxation discussed and approved included the following: (1) support of legislation requiring a 30% of the registered voters participating in excess levy and local bond issues; (2) legislation allowing creation of a tax super-vision and conservation commission in each county in appraising farmlands; (3) the establishment of the principle of evaluating farmland based on the ability of the land to produce; (4) asking county assessors to appraise farm buildings giving consideration to type of construction, obsolete and quality of materials in addition to square footage or area; (5) support of any proposal which provides a reasonable alternative to the property tax as a means of meeting the cost of education; (6) legislation that will establish a reasonable limitation on the per acre assessment that may be made against landowners for fire protection on range and forest lands; (7) amending the law to provide that when a notice of change of valuation of property is sent to a property owner it shall include a breakdown of the values of the buildings, water rights, and any other values attached to the property; addition be made to the Farm Deferral and Farm Zoning Act, passed by the 1963 legislature, to provide that eligibility be determined by the use of the land and that no other factor be considered; (8) opposing the requiring of a fee for filing an appeal to the County Board of Equalization; opposing a request by County Assessors Association that statutory qualifications be set for the office of County Assessor, to wit, that he must be a certified appraiser and have four years of college with a degree in business administration

216 Chest X-Rays Made on Visit

or its equivalent in business experience.

Transportation resolutions supported were those dealing with a request for investigation of the truck overload limits and fines imposed on farmers hauling raw unprocessed agricultural products; opposing financing highway projects through the sale of bonds; favoring the continued licensing of farm trucks on a quarterly basis and opposing the gross weight licensing principle for farm trucks; opposing the diversion of highway use funds to other than the building and maintenance of highways; favoring an amendment to the Federal Highway Use Tax which would provide that trucks operated on a seasonal basis should have a prorated tax for the months of actual use.

Some other resolutions discussed and passed included a stand on the constitutional revision which stated that major revisions to our State Constitution should be submitted in separate amendments; support of the principle that one body of a bicameral legislature be apportioned according to factors other than population, providing the citizens of the state have an opportunity to vote upon the apportionment; a request that the U. S. Congress make standard time the official time of the United States; favoring delaying redistricting of Oregon's Congressional districts until after the 1970 census and to consider the area and resources of the state; and supporting the continuance and extension of the National Wool Act.

Seat Belt Law Goes into Effect

Oregon's law requiring seat belts or harnesses in the front seats of all new passenger cars sold in the state went into effect November 1, according to Vern L. Hill, Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles.

The new law, passed by the 1963 legislature, says, in effect, that no person shall offer for sale a new passenger automobile that has seating for one or more passengers beside the driver unless the vehicle is equipped with seat belts or harnesses in the front seat. The minimum standards and specifications adopted by the Department of Motor Vehicles.

Hill noted that the law actually requires only two seat belts or harnesses, and recommended vehicles that normally carry additional passengers should also have belts installed for every passenger position to provide protection for all occupants.

The law also requires that seat belts installed in used vehicles must be of a type approved by the department. The department's specifications require that manufacturers of belts must have their product approved according to standards of the Society of Automotive Engineers as adopted by the department.
