## District Leaders Discuss Program For Older 4-Hers

The 4-H Junior Leadership project and Empire Builders program, both of which are planned to meet the interests and needs of older 4-H members, were featured topics at the district 4-H leaders' meeting in Moro last Wednesday, October 28.

The program dealt with such questions as: How do the responsibilities and goals of a junior leader compare with those for an Empire Builder? (In a junior leadership project the 4-H member meets with his leader and extension agent to plan specific activities to develop his leadership abilities. For example—he may teach younger members how to fill out project records, help them organize demonstrations, plan club tours or parties and encourage community service projects.)

"Empire Builders" are groups of teenagers who have an adult advisor but plan most of their own activities in order to learn

to work with others and to develop responsibility. They need not carry individual projects. Empire Builders group projects might include exploring career opportunities, planning recreation, or various service programs.)

Information on these two programs for older 4-H members and other techniques for helping them were presented by Ruth Brasler and Glenn Klein, state 4-H club agents. Mrs. Betty Hamlin, an experienced 4-H leader from Linn county, spoke about her experiences at the 1963 National 4-H leaders forum and principles of effective 4-H leadership.

Dean Graves, president of the South Morrow 4-H Leader's council, attended from Morrow county.
