Directors Change School Insurance to Full Coverage

(Continued from page 1) with the Army Engineers, by December 1.

It is expected that Dr. Hummel's report will be ready by about Thanksgiving time, after which the board will meet to consider it, preparatory to a final decision.

Transportation Studied
Supt. Potter also reported on surveys he has been making in connection with the district's transportation system in an effort for more efficient and economical operation.

He said that he spent a day at Klamath Falls with the transportation supervisor there. The system there has about the same number of busses and equal distances to travel but maintenance is about half that in Morrow county. The Klamath Falls school system has its own bus shop which represents an investment of about \$40,000, he said.

Supt. Potter said that he plans to check with other similar size districts in an effort to find other statistics for comparison.

To Sell Pine City School
Board of directors authorized the sale of any interest the district may have in the Pine City school property after Attorney Bob Abrams, Director Irvin Rauch and Supt. Potter learned on a visit there that the extension unit is not interested in purchasing the property under any consideration because of insurance, taxes and other costs. Because the school land was originally given to the district for

educational purposes only, with recourse of reverting to donors or their heirs, it has been a difficult problem to dispose of the property. Under the plan agreed upon, the district will advertise for bids on "any interest the district may have" in the property, which will then not require giving clear title.

It was reported that several in the area had expressed interest in obtaining the property on this basis.

Teacher Evaluation Set
Supt. Potter reported briefly on a personnel evaluation plan that is now being developed with the help of administrators. He said that while he realizes that some teachers do not like to be evaluated, he feels it is necessary to efficient functioning of the school system.

Principals have been asked to start considering teachers who are weak in any areas with the idea of helping them improve. Supt. Potter said that the entire staff, not only the certified staff, will come under the evaluation program, and that the help of the board and the entire community, is sought.

Anderson Appointed
Frank Anderson was reappointed to the district budget board with term to expire June 30, 1967. He joins James Driscoll and Clint McQuarrie, both of Heppner, Ellwynne Peck of Lexington and Warren McCoy of Irrigon on the committee.

Others yet to be appointed are members from Boardman and Ione.

First meeting of the budget committee will be at 7:30 on Thursday, December 10, at a place to be announced.

FUC Permit Eyed
Supt. Potter reported on investigation as to the possibility of using one school bus for non-school service when occasion warrants. This came about as a result of a ruling that school buses could not be used for non-school purposes on exempt licenses.

The superintendent said that he has been advised that the district can apply to the Public Utility Commission for a permit for irregular route service. A hearing must be held on the

application, after which the district could purchase a license and be charged on a mileage or time basis for the no-school trips.

"A number of districts handle it in this way where they do not have common carriers in their county," he said. It would be necessary for the district to be represented at the hearing.

In question are such trips as those that involve 4-H students, Portland 8th graders on the wheat tour, and others closely related to, but not a part of, school activities.

Agreement Signed
The board signed an agreement with Darold Hams of Hardman in which he will raze the George house on the elementary school property and clear the lot by March 1, 1965.

Trip Approved
The board authorized Supt. Potter to accept an invitation of School Administrators to go from the American Association to New Jersey in February to

participate in the association's evaluation of interpreting the role of education in the federal poverty program to school administrators. The superintendent said that it would require about a week to do the job.

Directors also approved a tuition contract with district 9-11, Umatilla county, involving four Morrow county students. The contract is the same as one executed last year.

Edwin Haselhoff of Texas was approved as science and mathematics teacher at Ione High school when it was necessary to release James Deeney because he was unable to certify under state standards.

Meeting of the Oregon School Boards association in Portland next week was announced. Director Harvey Warner said that he planned to attend, and Director Howard Cleveland and Supt. Potter will also attend for at least part of the meeting which runs from Wednesday through Friday at the Hilton Hotel.

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
