

Water System Proposed For Irrigon

IRRIGON — The Irrigon council met last Tuesday evening, and Mayor Chester Wilson presented a proposed water system for the City of Irrigon. Inasmuch as no Federal funds have been allocated for Public Utilities the water system proposed has less area to be developed initially than that proposed by Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield a year ago. The area to be served initially would all lie North of the railroad, and would cover the area where homes are more concentrated. Expansion of the system could take place at any time it was justifiable.

The proposed plan calls for a well to be drilled according to the engineers' recommendations with mains and laterals to be installed of equal or larger size. The proposal also calls for the purchase of a tractor with backhoe and loader. The work would be accomplished with local labor, with those paying a front-foot assessment having an opportunity to work out their cost.

A public meeting will be held Monday evening, November 30, at the A. C. Houghton cafeteria from 7:30 to 9 o'clock to present the proposed system to the public.

BOARDMAN — The city council met Tuesday night of last week, the meeting having been postponed from November 3, due to the election. Arthur Allen's resignation from the council was accepted, due to his moving out of the city limits. On the advice of M. D. Van Valkenburgh, city attorney, the council met recently at the church with a recount of the city ballots, and the following councilmen were elected: Ed Kuhn, 78 votes, Vernon Russell, 72, Zearl Gillespie, 70, for a four year term; Seth Russell, 66, Wally Hendrix, 56, and Joe Tate, 44, for a two year term.
