

Sudden Illness Claims Jesse Mason, County Pioneer

IONE — Jesse Martin Mason, 85, of The Dalles died unexpectedly of a heart attack on Friday afternoon, November 13, according to word received by relatives here. Mr. Mason was born October 6, 1879, to Joseph and Augusta Mason, early Morrow county pioneers, at the family home on Rhea Creek.

Before moving to The Dalles in 1911, Mr. Mason owned a butcher shop in Ione.

His wife preceded him in death in 1923. He is survived by four daughters, Beatrice Gerhke and Mrs. Jerrod (Eleanor) Runyon of The Dalles, Mrs. Joe (Florence) Ritter of Maupin, and Miss Mary Mason of Portland. Two brothers and three sisters surviving are Joseph Mason of Prineville, Harold Mason of Elk Grove, Calif., Mrs. Ella Caples of Portland, and Mrs. Clara Kincaid and Mrs. Mabel Cotter of Ione. Also three grandchildren and several nieces and nephews survive.

Funeral services were to be held in The Dalles on Thursday.
