Warning Given Those Who Lag On Brand Records

Brands on livestock are not of much value in identifying animals if the brand owner hasn't kept this brand recorded under his name.

Oregon's livestock owners are being reminded of this by Roy Nelson, chief of the Oregon Department of Agriculture's livestock division, as he warns that December 31 is the deadline for re-recording of Oregon's livestock brands with the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

The Oregon law requires that brands be re-recorded every five years and Nelson points out that the department cannot extend the re-recording period because the law explicitly sets the period for re-recording from July 1 to December 31.

In July the department mailed application blanks for re-recording to 12,755 brand owners, several of whom have more than one brand.

Mrs. Wilma Russell, brand recorder for the state, says only 8,772 brand owners had re-recorded their brands by late November.

Out of the group that has not re-recorded there are some 250 to 300 whom the department has been unable to contact.

Mrs. Russell says the department has had assistance from the department's livestock officers and brand inspectors, the sheriffs of the various counties and agricultural extension agents in attempting to locate these brand owners, but has been unsuccessful.

Some brand owners have only partially completed making application for re-recording of their brands. These people have already been given reminders that their applications have not been completed.

Any in this group still not having completed their applications by December 31 will receive a pink slip, which draws attention to the fact that the livestock brand recording expired January 1, 1965. Nelson said if this does not bring an immediate response the brand will be considered available for new applicants.

And, Mrs. Russell points out there is a continuing demand for brands. In fact, the department has recorded 344 brands for new owners since the first of July this year.

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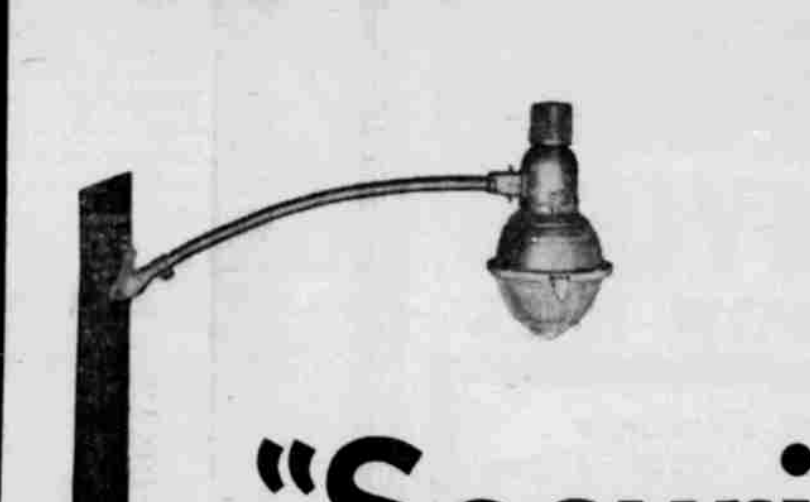


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
