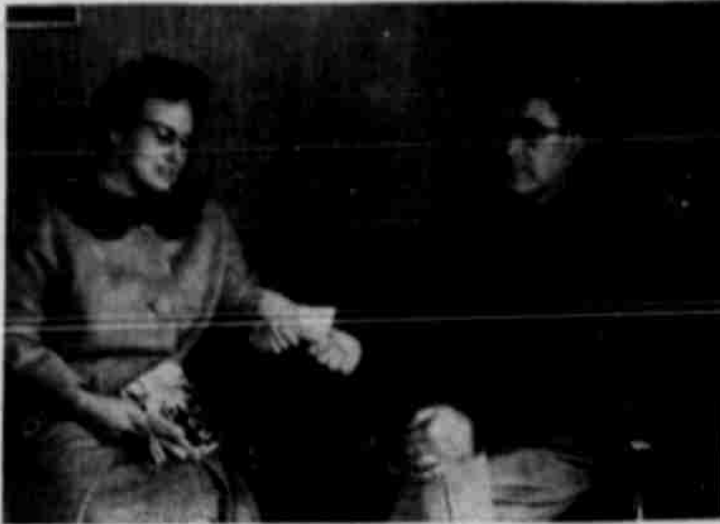

Adventists Start Mission Appeal

Seventh-day Adventists this week are starting their 61st World Mission Appeal, Pastor Elwood Boyd announces. Because of this annual program, the denomination provided material and educational or medical aid free of charge to 10,700,000 persons, he said. "Taking seriously the Savior's words, 'Inasmuch as ye have done it unto the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me,' Adventists carry on health, welfare, educational and Christian work in nearly every country in the world," the pastor said.

Local members will participate in Christmas caroling and in making business contacts for contributions on the appeal. The funds received are divided between local needs, such as disaster relief units, and world needs, such as clinics, leper colonies and mission schools—often the only facilities available to large populations.

A "get-acquainted" session with the staff of Battelle Northwest Laboratories at Richland is scheduled at Pendleton for Tuesday night, December 8.

According to William H. Belt, Hermiston, president of the Space Age Industrial Park Development Assn., the Mid-Columbia Planning Council and the Umatilla and Morrow Port commissions are joining SPADA in sponsoring a meeting at the Temple Hotel at 8:00 p.m., open to the public.

Clyde R. Tipton, Jr., staff manager of Battelle Pacific Northwest Laboratories, will be principal speaker. Dr. Sherwood Fawcett, laboratory director, and Orval Berry, manager of the firm's Portland office, will also participate. Sam Mallicoat, director of the Oregon Planning and Development office, will be present.
