## Field Man Advises Check on Accounts

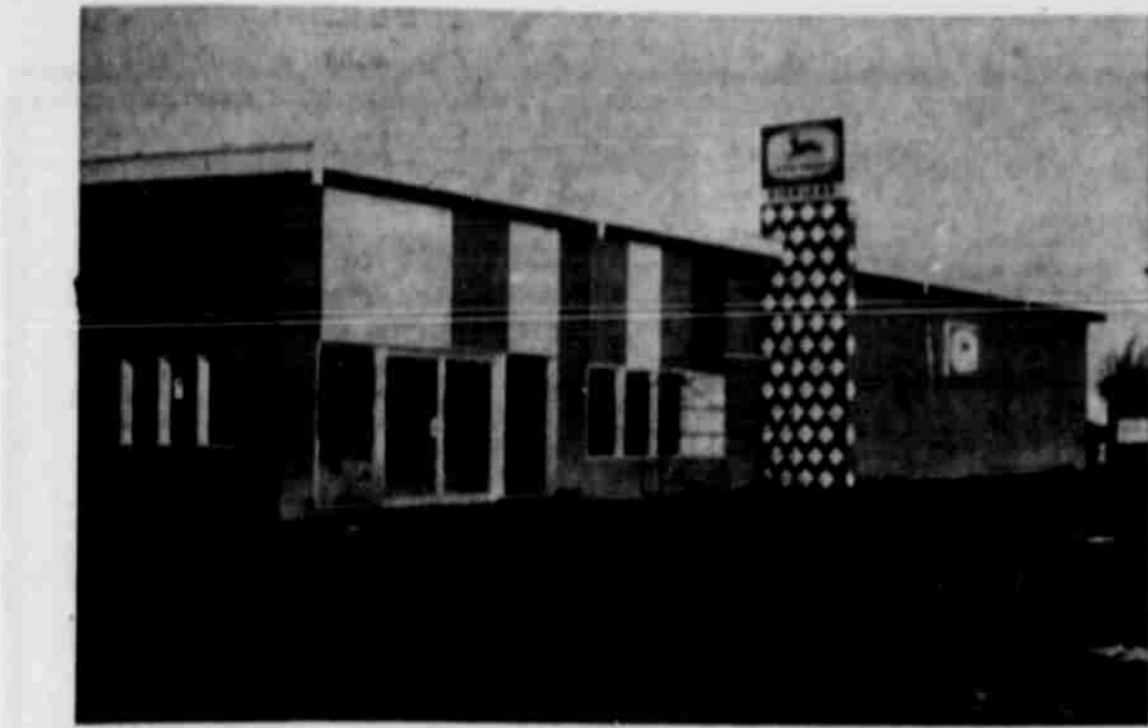


