

Victor Carlson, Former Rancher, Dies in Portland

Funeral services for Victor Leonard Carlson, 80, were held at the First Immanuel Lutheran Church in Portland Tuesday, December 1, Interment was at Sunset Hills Memorial Park. Officiating at the service was the Rev. Kenneth Johnson and organist was Mrs. Clarence A. Beyer. Mr. Carlson died at Emanuel Hospital Sunday, November 29, after a brief illness.

Mr. Carlson was born in Ione August 30, 1884, son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Carlson. He lived his entire life in Morrow County until a few years ago, when he retired and moved to Portland. The family made its home in the Gooseberry community, and he engaged in wheat farming. On November 25, 1918, he was married to Julia Hagstrom and to this union four children were born.

He was a lifetime member of Valby Lutheran church and at the time of his death was an active member of the First Immanuel Lutheran Church in Portland.

Surviving are his wife, Julia, of Portland; two sons, Louis A. Carlson of Ione and Clifford L. Carlson of Portland; two daughters, Mrs. Joyce Darst of Salem and Mrs. Robert (Mildred) Hope of Eugene; and two sisters, Mrs. Edith Hite of Portland and Mrs. Jesse (Amanda) Warfield of Ione. 14 grandchildren and many other relatives and friends.

Morrow County Bond Sales Drop

U. S. Savings Bonds sales in Morrow county amounted to \$7,037 for the month of October. This compares with \$33,715 during the same month in 1963.

Total sales for the state during the month are \$2,999,954, up from the year ago total of \$2,918,712.

Nationally, cash sales of Series E and H Bonds amounted to \$365 million for October, while the total value of Savings Bonds held by Americans topped the \$48 billion mark for an all-time high.

State Director Declares Need For Agri-Council

The need for an Oregon Agri-Council to speak for the farmer was stressed by State Director of Agriculture J. F. Short in a speech at the annual meeting of the Western Oregon Livestock Association in Salem November 20.

Picturing such a council as the united voice of Oregon agriculture, one that would tell the agricultural story and develop good public understanding and support, the director listed a number of problems with which a council could concern itself.

These included general problems affecting the present and future stability of the farmer, promotion of a solidly based growth of agricultural production and development of irrigation, drainage, flood control and soil conservation.

He stressed the fact that the council he envisioned would not replace, duplicate or compete with existing farm organizations, but would include those organizations now serving agriculture in their respective fields, as well as organizations of agricultural-based industries, such as grain and seed dealers, implement dealers, fertilizer manufacturers, crop processors and marketing agencies, and possible representatives of banks, trucking lines and railroads.

Reminding that over 40 percent of the total labor force is engaged in agriculture and its allied industries, the director pointed out that this council would have them working as one for the common welfare.

Discussing legislation affecting farmers, Short said farmers must become alert to the changing political picture and take steps to tell elected representatives about agriculture, because there are fewer farmers and persons familiar with agriculture serving as legislators than there once were.

He told the livestock group legislators are receptive to solid facts but that farmers cannot take it for granted the legislators automatically know agriculture's problems. It is the farmer's responsibility, he said, to tell agriculture's story to the lawmakers.

Bank Debits Down During October

Bank debits for the Pendleton area including Morrow and Umatilla counties decreased in October 1964, compared to October 1963, the University of Oregon Bureau of Business Research has reported.

Debits for October 1964 totaled \$41,184,647. For September 1964, the total was \$39,368,530 and for October 1963, the total was \$42,367,396.

Oregon with 275 banks reporting had a percentage change of plus 0.1 in October 1964 as compared with September 1964 and a 0.8 percentage change as compared with October 1963.

Total debits in the state for October 1964 came to \$2,739,386,484. For September 1964 the total was \$2,737,319,352 and for October 1963, the total came to \$2,762,573,152.
