

Zoning Ordinance Gets Approval at Boardman

BOARDMAN—The city planning commission held another meeting last week with David Rowe of Pendleton, eastern Oregon consultant from the Bureau of Municipal Research. After his study of the recommendations made by the commission at an earlier meeting for an amendment to the zoning ordinance in the new town so people could purchase lots in the city limits to put on privately owned trailer houses, Rowe advised that the amendment be adopted. The hearing for the ordinance was held last Thursday night, and they were adopted after no objections were raised. A suggestion was made by Grattan Hoffman that elevations be increased to allow taller buildings in the zones.

Martha Peck became the first person known to ski the new fall-line trail from the top of Arbuckle to the warming hut when she completed the run Sunday morning. She reported an average depth of 18 inches of snow on the trail.

The run took only about eight minutes but the climb to the top required about 30 minutes. Her comment about the recently cleared trail was, "With the powder snow we usually get, this is going to be one of the better ones in Eastern Oregon. It was no effort to ski—I just floated through that dry snow."

Martha, who is 16, has been skiing each winter since she was eight and is a junior member of the area ski patrol. She will attend the Pacific Northwest Ski Instructor's Association training clinic at Spout Springs December 23. After qualifying as an apprentice instructor she will teach skiing at the Arbuckle area.

28 Ski Fans See Movies Shown Here

Twenty-eight skiing fans enjoyed movies Monday, November 30, at Farley Motor Company garage. Later a preliminary sign-up for ski patrol members was made.

The first film featured Stein Eriksen skiing the Aspen, Colo., resort complex and was called, "Ski with Buick."

The second film was "Avalanches to Order" and showed the dangers encountered in skiing avalanche localities. Danger is reduced by skiing them down through use of explosives.

The films presented were a joint sponsorship of the U. S. Forest Service (Heppner District), Farley Motor Company, and Peck's Ski Shop.

At the ski patrol sign-up it was announced that the Arbuckle Mountain Patrol will affiliate with the National Ski Patrol system. At a later date to be announced Red Cross standard and advanced first aid courses will be conducted. Mountain first aid practices will be held at the ski area.
