

Waterfront Park Plan Presented to Council

BOARDMAN — The Boardman City Council and Planning Commission held a joint meeting last week with B. C. Christensen and Tom Slater from the U. S. Corps of Engineers office in Walla Walla. Christensen is planner for the Umatilla pool. They presented a preliminary master plan of the new Boardman waterfront park, which when completed will have protected moorage facilities for some two hundred boats, picnic grounds, bathhouses, beach and others.

This program would be carried out by the corps under the proposed recreational program of the John Day pool.

Christensen also explained that other public agencies, if approved and licensed, would be permitted to operate there. Otherwise, the corps would maintain and operate it.

Help Asked on Vandalism

Edwin A. Demaris, technician from the U. S. Corps of Engineers office in Walla Walla, has asked the city of Boardman for assistance to stop vandalism of the piezometer pipes in the area. These pipes are located throughout the Boardman project, and are used to check the static water level. They are painted fluorescent orange.

Demaris stated that the FBI has been called in to try to trace the trouble, as there has been considerable damage done to the pipes, either by running into them with cars or other vehicles. Mayor Dewey West has asked the Morrow county sheriff's office and the Oregon State Police to cooperate.

Port Discusses Plans
