

Raymond Promoted At Gazette-Times; Operator Added

Arnold Raymond, linotype operator at the Gazette-Times for seven years and shop foreman for the past three years, has been promoted to the position of advertising manager beginning January 1. Mr. and Mrs. Wes Sherman, publishers, announce. He will also handle commercial printing.

Coming from Chewelah, Wn., to take the position of linotype operator is Carl Abrahamson, who also started as of the first of the year. A former Corporal in the Marines, Abrahamson saw service in the Korean war. He gained experience as a linotype operator, after attending a trade school, at Metaline Falls, Wn., on a Piedmont, Calif., newspaper, and in other locations.

His wife, Joan, is a legal secretary at Chewelah and is a graduate of Holy Names college, Spokane. The Abrahamsons have four children, Stephen, 11, Charlene, 6, Teri, 4, and Raymond, 2.
