Milton Morgan of Ione, past president of the Oregon Wheat League, was elected chairman of the Tri-State Grain Standards Commission at a meeting in Portland Thursday in conjunction with the national association of Wheat Growers meeting. State of Oregon, Washington and Idaho are included in the commission's scope.


At the Thursday meeting the commission discussed the effects of federal contracting classes regulations on Pacific Northwest wheat. It commended the grain division of the Department of Agriculture for relaxing the tolerance on grading but maintained that the tolerances are still closer than necessary and pledged itself to work for further relaxing of the grading regulations.
