Leader's Banquet To Observe 50th 4-H Club Year

"Fifty Golden Years" has been selected as the theme for the Morrow County 4-H Leader's banquet Wednesday, January 27, according to Donna George, county extension agent.

Four-H club work began in Oregon in 1914, and in 1918, when 4-H projects were under the charge of county school superintendents, Morrow county's 4-H work began.

The 4-H program has played an important role in the development of our nation since the first clubs, which centered around projects in raising corn and canning tomatoes in the south. Today, it has expanded to offer some 50 projects to Oregon boys and girls. These projects and club activities are planned to prepare for citizenship as well as vocations in today's world.

Much of the credit for progress in 4-H belongs to the volunteer adult leaders. Their chief duties include advising 4-H members in project work, club business and recreation and record keeping. But often they also are found hauling youngsters and exhibits, phoning, conducting talent nights or dress revues, and participating in community service projects.

Most of the rewards of 4-H leader are in the form of personal satisfaction—seeing their club members develop responsibility and skills.

Public recognition will be given last year's Morrow county 4-H leaders at the banquet Wednesday. They will be guests of the Columbia Basin Electric Coop. Fifty-two persons will receive pins recognizing completion of 1 to 5 years 4-H leadership. Another 15 will be presented special certificates for service to 4-H, varying from 6 to 20 years.
