

# Ione Wins Pair With Ease; Ties For League Lead

Taking two games over the week-end — Stanfield Friday night and Helix Saturday night — Ione High's basketball team moved into a first place tie in the Umatilla-Morrow B league with a record of four wins against one loss.

The Cardinals topped Stanfield, 56-38, and thumped Helix, 53-43, both on the lone floor.

In each game Coach Gene Dockter's boys rolled to goose-sized halftime leads, 31-10 over Stanfield and 29-13 over Helix.

Joe Halvorsen scored 27 points in the two nights while his brother, Mark Halvorsen, and Jay Ball each had 20.

Against Stanfield both Mark and Joe rebounded exceptionally well, getting 14 and 13 respectively. Ball led Ione scorers with 14, matched by Stanfield's Fred Guthery, also with 14. Mark Halvorsen was second high for Ione with 12 and Wes Holstein, hit 11.

Stan Holstein played a good floor game offensively and defensively to help contribute to the victory. The Cardinals hit 35% from the field and 60% from the foul line, compared to Stanfield's 24% from the field and 45% from the free throw stripe.

Against Helix, Mark Halvorsen led rebounding with 15, followed by brother Joe's 13. However, Joe topped the scoring with 18, followed by Doug Harper of Helix with 14.

Ione hit 39% from the field and 40% from the free throw line against 27% and 28% for Helix.

After leading all the way, the Cards hit a cold spell in the third quarter, going 4½ minutes before scoring a point. Helix, extremely cold on shooting in the first half, found the range after intermission but could not overcome the big Ione lead.

# Two Road Losses Plummet Mustangs To League Cellar

Two losses on the road over the week-end plummeted the Heppner High varsity basketball team to the bottom of the west, ern division of the Greater Oregon league with an 0-3 record. They lost to Burns Friday night, 63-44, and to Grant Union of John Day Saturday night, 64-30.

In a rough battle at Burns, the Highlanders got off to a quick start, taking an 11-8 first quarter lead. Kessel of Burns led the Highlanders with eight points in the second quarter and his team took a 10-point halftime margin, 31-21. The Burns boys widened the gap at 46-34 at the end of three periods and ran away in the fourth period for the final 19-point victory.

Kessel of Burns capped scoring honors with 16 counters while Stuart Dick of the Mustangs garnered 11.

Saturday night the Mustangs found themselves on the short side of the 64-30 score as the Grant Union Prospectors led all the way. The Prospectors led, 16-12 at the first period stop and 29-20 at the half.

At the end of three quarters, the Heppner five narrowed the gap to eight, but Grant Union fired a 19-point fourth period while holding the Horsemens to 13. Gene Heliker led all scorers with 17 points.

Ione started fast, took an early 4-1 lead from the Mustangs but couldn't hold it. Carl Bauman came on strong in the first quarter and led the Mustangs to a 19-10 advantage by the quarter's end.

With scoring assistance by Gene Heliker, Bill Snyder, Mac Hoskins, Stuart Dick, John Wagenblast and Jim Doherty, the Heppner squad gained a 38-25 halftime margin.
