Change of directional signs at the Boardman interchange of the Highway 80N will be urged again by the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce in a letter to the State Highway Department.

Members have pointed out that the sign going east on the highway merely shows "Irigon" prior to the turnoff that also comes south via the bomb range road, creating confusion to the motorist who wishes to go south. Going west, nothing indicates that the exit also leads to Heppner although a small arrow sign at the immediate turnoff points to Lexington.

The letter, approved in a motion passed by the chamber, will ask that Heppner be indicated on the signs.

Al Lamb gave a brief report on the national Wheat Growers association meeting in Portland to the Chamber members, saying that it was decided at the session in Portland that growers "want to carry on the certificate plan and have it adopted for a five-year period."

He said that the growers want more income and agree that the certificate plan on a year-to-year basis is expensive.

The wheat growers also went on record as favoring no restrictions on wheat to Red nations, Lamb said.

Judge Paul Jones gave a report on flood damage to roads and told of the plan for restoration assistance that will be provided by the federal government.

THIRTY YEARS AGO
(January 17, 1935)

Hotel Heppner has been reserved to capacity for the 38th annual Oregon Woolgrowers' convention, Garnett Barratt, association vice chairman, and Frank Turner, chairman of housing, say that living facilities will be augmented by two of three sleeping cars which will arrive on a special train to Heppner, courtesy of the railroad.

The city fire siren will be blown each Monday at noon until further notice, announces Mayor W. W. Smead. The measure is taken as a precaution against the siren getting out of order during the cold weather.

Tuesday, January 15, was the first birthday anniversary of the Heppner Branch of the First National Bank of Portland. According to E. B. MacNaughton, president, Dr. A. D. McMurdo and Mrs. C. P. Brown were the first depositors, and David Wilson received book No. 1 in the savings department.

Petition pushers for the Townsend old age pension plan found many ready signers in Heppner this week. At least three of the petitions were in circulation.

TWENTY YEARS AGO
(January 20, 1945)

Gordon's Drug Store, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Earl Gordon, was purchased by John Saager of Freewater. The Gordons, who purchased the Tash confectionery located on the corner near the Noble saddle shop, modernized the rooms in 1940 and launched into the drug business.

Work on the construction of a new residence for Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Rosewall was started when a power shovel from the Joelson rock crusher excavated the basement. Site of the new residence is the former Heppner Flouring Mill property on North Court street.

Mr. and Mrs. Chris Brown were happy this week upon receipt of a postal card from their son Paul, prisoner of war of the Japanese. It was dated May 8, 1944.

Howard Pettyjohn was home on boot leave from Farragut, having completed his initial training in the navy.

Heppner High school's paper, The Hehisch, appeared in printed form for the first time from limotype slugs. Marylou Ferguson is editor; Colleen Miller, assistant editor, and Lauren Corwin, business manager.

TEN YEARS AGO
(January 21, 1955)

Heppner's first woman mayor, Mrs. Mary Van Stevens, and new councilmen Allen Case, William Collins and Jack Van Winkle, were sworn in by council chairman W. C. Rosewall, in the absence of former mayor Dr. L. D. Tibbles.

Installation of the new tile board ceiling in the dancing section of the fair pavilion was completed this week.

Plans for bringing television to Heppner are being investigated by several interested persons. Strong signals have been received about two miles west of the city limits, highly adequate for piping into the town.

Four Morrow county gridders were named to play on the East team for the Shrine classic. They are Malcolm McKinney, Ione Ralph Mariatt, Heppner; Larry Groves, Lexington, and Denny Swanson, Ione.

The Star Theater has reopened after being closed for installation of new equipment which will make possible the showing of Cinemascope and wide screen motion pictures.

Eight Veterans Get Loans Here

Oregon Department for Veterans Affairs granted farm and home loans to 3,734 veterans last year in the amount of \$41,723,000. H. C. Saalfeld, director, reported today.

This was an 8 percent increase over 1963 when 3,532 veterans borrowed \$38,496,000. Last year's volume makes a total of 48,644 loans in the amount of \$415,996,174 to Oregon's World War II and Korean War veterans since the program started in 1945.

In Morrow County last year, loans were granted to 8 veterans in the amount of \$72,400.00, compared to 5 loans in 1963 for \$44,400.00. Since the start of the program, loans have gone to 88 veterans here in the amount of \$622,150.00.

Saalfeld said that of the nearly \$416 million borrowed, veterans have repaid \$254 million in principal and interest. They are repaying at the rate of about \$3.5 million a month, with interest payments alone averaging about \$875,000. Of the more than 48,000 loans granted, 29,116 were outstanding on December 31 in the amount of \$268,175,232.

State Veteran Aid Possible For Education

Korean War veterans whose educational benefits expire under the federal GI bill January 31 may be eligible to draw state benefits to continue their studies, the Oregon Department of Veterans Affairs reported today, according to C. J. D. Bauman.

To receive state aid, the veteran must have been an Oregon resident for one year prior to his Korean War service, have served more than 90 days during that conflict and be an Oregon resident when he applies.

All training under the federal GI bill ends January 31 except for rehabilitation trainees but there is no deadline for Korean veterans under the Oregon program. State law bars payment of federal and state benefits at the same time.

The Oregon benefit pays a student \$50 a month for full-time undergraduate study, and up to \$35 a month for other studies. The World War II veteran may still receive the benefit but only if he had enrolled in a program prior to his cut-off date of June 30, 1959 and has not exhausted his entitlement. He may receive one month's benefits for each month of military service, up to 36 months.

Veterans interested should contact the veterans' clerk at their school or college, their county veterans' service officer, or the Department of Veterans Affairs.

Emergency Loans Open to Farmers

Emergency loans through the Farmer's Home Administration are a standby source of credit to serve farmers who have suffered substantial production losses and whose available resources are such that credit from conventional sources cannot meet their needs to enable them to re-establish their normal farming operation.

Loans can cover the purchase of feed, seed, fertilizer, replacement of equipment and live stock, farm operating, home operating, replacement or repair of buildings, fences, drainage and irrigation systems on individual farms that were damaged or destroyed by the disaster. Interest rate is three percent and repayment is scheduled according to purpose of the loan. Debts cannot be refinanced with such loans.

Full information and application forms can be obtained by contacting the Farmers Home Administration office at 105 S. E. Byers Avenue, Pendleton. This office serves Umatilla, Morrow, Gilliam, Sherman, and Wasco counties.

Other lending authorities of Farmers Home Administration cover a wide variety of needs of farmers and rural residents in small communities of 2500 or less in population.

ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS

Sealed proposals for the construction of a new townsite for the City of Boardman, Oregon, addressed to the Mayor and City Council, Boardman, Oregon, will be received at the office of the City Recorder, City Hall, Boardman, Oregon, until 2:00 p.m. Pacific Standard Time, on the 9th day of February 1965, and then will be publicly opened and read.

The work contemplated is divided into five schedules as follows:

Schedule P. The work includes constructing approximately 14,200 linear feet of asphalt concrete paved streets, approximately 1,900 linear feet of bituminous surfaced streets, including graded shoulders, storm sewers, culverts, drainage facilities, seeding and incidental work.

Schedule Q. The work includes the construction of a railroad overpass structure, approximately 190 feet long, over the new location for the Union Pacific Railroad track. The structure consists of timber bents on concrete foundations with a laminated wood deck supported on wood beams and steel girders. The Owner will furnish salvaged timbers for part of the framing; all other materials are to be furnished by the Contractor.

Schedule R. The work includes furnishing and installing approximately 8,800 linear feet of 4-inch, approximately 6,000 linear feet of 6-inch, and approximately 35 linear feet of 8-inch Class 150 asbestos-cement pipe waterlines, complete with gate valves and appurtenances. Also furnishing and installing approximately 600 linear feet of 1 1/2-inch and 2-inch galvanized pipe, approximately 2,100 linear feet of 3/4-inch and 1-inch copper tubing, necessary house services and meters for the system, and performing all trenching, backfill, and incidental work for a complete water system.

Schedule S. The work includes approximately 10,420 linear feet of 8-inch sewer pipe, approximately 3,700 linear feet of 4- and 6-inch service connection pipe, approximately 460 linear feet of 4-inch pressure pipe, two highway crossings, one of which is through an existing casing, 35 manholes, and other appurtenances, and furnishing and installing one factory assembled 90 gpm raw sewer.

The work includes the construction of a sewage stabilization pond of approximately 2.75 acres, 200 feet of inlet pipe, a chlorine contact chamber within the pond, an outlet structure with necessary equipment, a factory assembled 150 gpm raw sewage pumping station, approximately 1,741 feet of pressure pipeline, approximately 785 feet of 10-inch outfall sewer, one railroad overcrossing, approximately 75 feet of 12-inch steel casing for crossing the location of a future railroad, manholes, electrical work, and other appurtenances.
