

Two Elderly Men Of Hardman Die On January 28

Death came on the same day, Thursday, January 28, for two long-time residents of Hardman, John Eston Stevens, 89, and Wilbert A. Knighten, 70.

Mr. Stevens died in Pioneer Memorial hospital, Heppner, and Mr. Knighten was found dead Friday in his home at Hardman, the apparent victim of a heart attack.

Funeral services for Mr. Stevens were Monday, February 1, at 2 p.m. in the Sweeney Mortuary Chapel, Heppner, with the Rev. Kenneth Robinson, pastor of the Hope and Valley Lutheran churches, officiating. Interment was in the Hardman cemetery.

Services for Mr. Knighten were Tuesday, February 2, at 2 p.m. in the IOOF hall, Hardman, with the Rev. R. E. Middleton of Condon officiating. Interment was in the Hardman cemetery.

John Eston Stevens was born in Marion county, Iowa, April 11, 1875, the son of Virgil and Matilda Stevens. At the age of five he moved with his family to Weston, and a year later the family came to Hardman where his father took up a homestead.

After attending school at Hardman, Mr. Stevens married Maggie Allen in 1906. She was the daughter of James H. and Marinda Allen, pioneers in the Hardman area. Harold Stevens, son of the deceased, still operates a family ranch at Hardman.

Mrs. Stevens died in 1913. Her husband retired in 1948. He entered the hospital here last May.

Surviving are the son, Harold, of Hardman; two daughters, Mrs. Edith Musgrave of Monument, and Alta Stevens of Hardman; two grandchildren; and many nieces and nephews.

Mr. Knighten was born January 25, 1895, at Parkers Mill, son of Robert K. and Margaret Compton Knighten, and was a life-time resident of the Hardman area. He never married. He worked on stock ranches much of his life and was a member of the IOOF lodge at Hardman.

Surviving are a brother, Elmer Knighten of Condon; and a sister, Mrs. Myrtle Inel of Klamath Falls; as well as nieces and nephews in Oregon, Washington, and California.

79-Year Resident, Katie Minert, Dies Here Sunday

Katie Minert, 81, who came to Heppner at the age of three years and remained here for nearly 79 years, died Sunday in Pioneer Memorial hospital.

Funeral services were Wednesday at 2 p.m. at the Sweeney Mortuary Chapel with the Rev. Earl Soward officiating. Interment was in the Heppner Masonic cemetery.

Miss Minert was born March 14, 1883, in Albany. She never married.

For many years she was secretary to Frank Turner in the Turner Insurance Agency. She was a member of the First Christian church.

Surviving are two cousins, Mrs. Bertha Wells of Heppner, and Mrs. Amanda Brinson of Albany.

Telegram from the War Dept. told of the death in Butzbach, Germany, of the Ballweg's 20-year-old son in service there and his new bride, Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Ray Ballweg. The couple had apparently been asphyxiated January 19 by a faulty bathroom heater in their apartment.

They were married December 18 while he was home on leave, and his bride, also of Ft. Worth, had joined him in Germany only the week before the accident.
