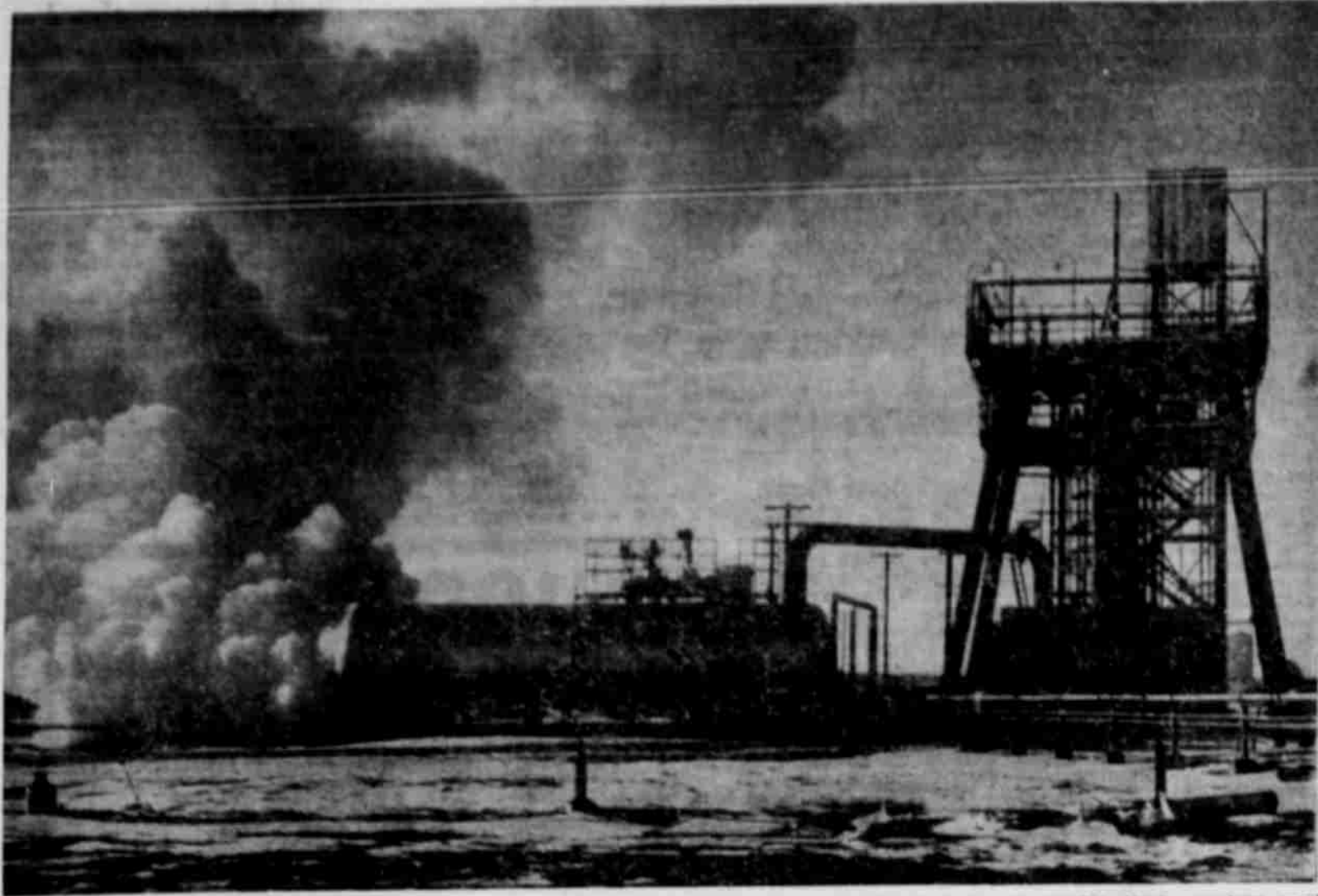

Boeing Prepares For Initial Tests

First tests at the Boeing Boardman Test Site in northeastern Oregon are scheduled for about February 15.

The announcement was made by Lysle A. Wood, vice president and general manager of Boeing's Aero-Space Division.

Wood said that small-scale company-funded tests of various cryogenic fuel systems will be conducted through 1965. The Boardman test organization will be headed by Dr. Nathan L. Krisberg, division director of aero-space technology. Leonard P. Bonifaci, former manager of the company's Tulalip Test Site near Everett, Washington, has been named Boardman Test Site manager.

Boeing will employ about 35 persons at the Boardman site for the cryogenic fuel tests.

The company has invested approximately \$1.3 million in test facilities at the 100,000-acre Boardman site since the long-term lease was signed with the State of Oregon. Construction of the test stand complex, located about 13 miles from the town of Boardman, was started in May 1964 and completed January 11, 1965.

Two Irrigon Scouts To Get Eagle Awards

IRRIGON—A special Court of Honor will be held at the A. C. Houghton cafeteria Wednesday evening, February 10, at 7:30 p.m. when two scouts, Bob McRae and Tom Van Horn will advance to the class of Eagle Scout. This is the first time Irrigon has had an Eagle Scout, who must fill requirements of second class, first class, Star and Life. He must also earn at least 21 merit badges.

Bob McRae began his scouting career in 1961. As there was no troop in Irrigon, he joined Troop No. 53 in Hermiston. In 1962 Troop No. 167 was organized in Irrigon under the sponsorship of the Irrigon PTA. Al Reeves was chosen scoutmaster and Don Olmscheid as representative.

Bob has earned 27 merit badges to date, and is working on more. He has been eligible since August to take his Eagle Board but decided to wait until Tom was also eligible. They passed their tests in December, 1964.

Tom VanHorn was born August 28, 1950, at Heppner. The family moved to Hermiston, where he began his scouting career in the Cub Scouts. The family moved to Irrigon in 1959.

Tom became a Star Scout on December 3, 1963, and took the next step to Life Scout on April 14, 1964. He passed the Eagle Board of Review in Pendleton on November 30, 1964, and in December was appointed instructor of the troop. Tom has earned a total of 29 merit badges and a 2-year perfect attendance pin.

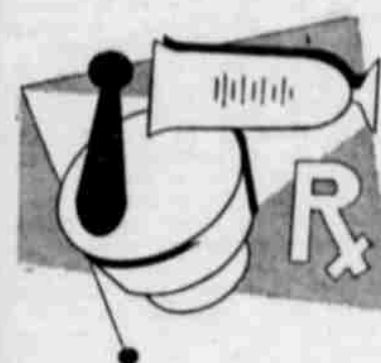
NOTICE OF BUDGET COMMITTEE MEETINGS
