## Personal Property Tax Returns Due

Deadline for filing personal property tax returns is March 2. Assessor Rod Thomson reminds Morrow county residents who are required to file such returns.

Assessor Thomson said that forms for the personal property returns have been mailed to those known to have personal property, but to date the response has been light with about only 20% received.

He urged taxpayers to get returns in soon to avoid late filing penalties and pointed out that early filing will facilitate processing and checking.

Any who have not received forms are asked to get them from the assessor's office in the courthouse.

Those who received a form but do not have taxable personal property are asked to check the space provided, sign the form and return it to the assessor. If the property has been sold, the name and address of the buyer should be indicated.

Household furniture is not taxable when used by the owner, but it is taxable when used commercially.

With a great 25-point first period, the Heppner High Jayvee basketball hoopers swept over the Sherman Huskies on the local maplecourt January 22, 64-46.

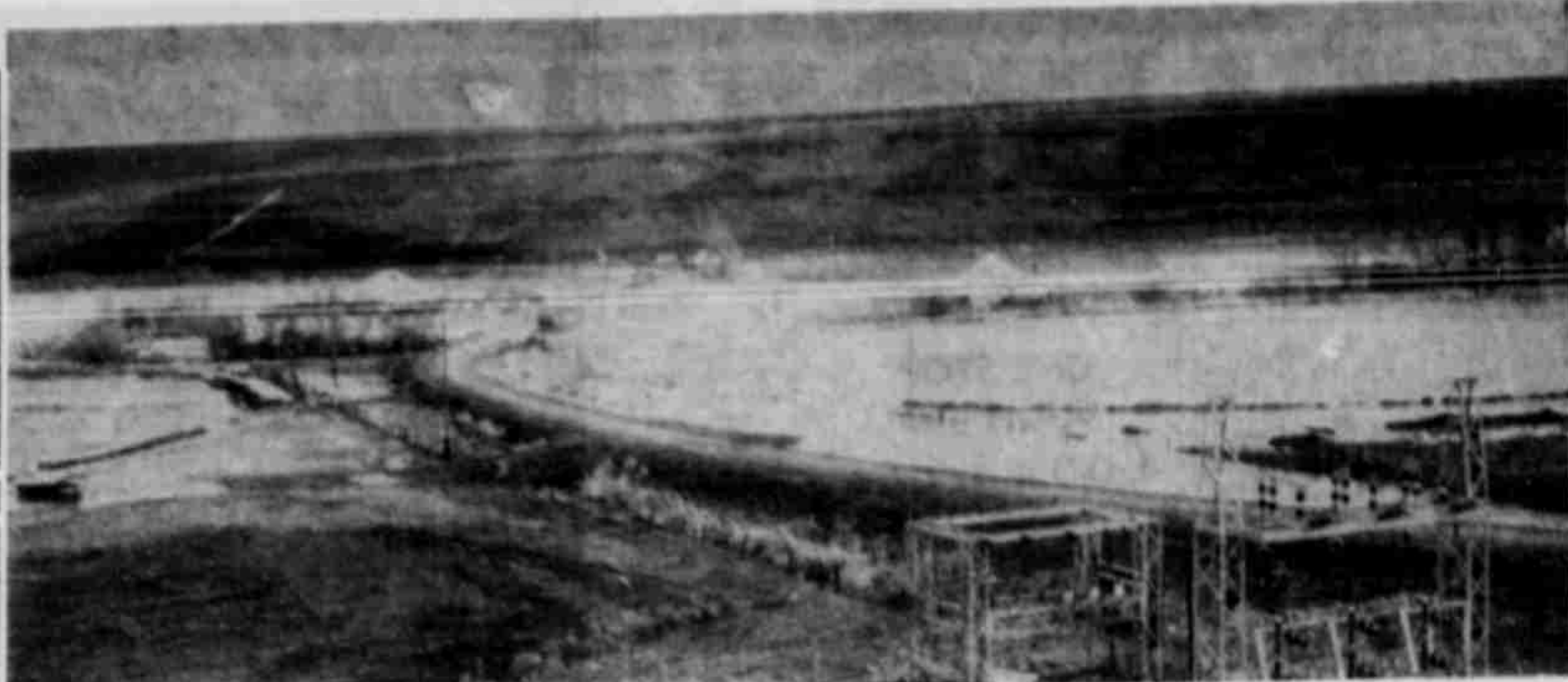

## Wilson to Serve For Third Term

IRRIGON — Chester A. Wilson, who served as Mayor of the City of Irrigon the past two years, was unanimously reappointed to a third term by the city council January 19.

Under the Irrigon charter, the voters elect a 6-member council with three terms expiring every two years. Each January the council appoints a mayor for the year from its members.

Mayor Wilson is employed as a structural fireman at McNary Dam. Before moving to Irrigon, he worked as a logger and carpenter. The Wilsons followed the ministry for several years, pastoring Assembly of God churches in Idaho and Oregon. They are parents of five children, two of whom are yet at home.

During the time that Wilson has served as mayor, the following accomplishments have been noted: A planning study of the City of Irrigon was conducted by Kizlovski and Fritsche, planning consultants of Lake Oswego; a feasibility study on water and sewage was accomplished by Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, Engineering Firm of Seattle; 15 street lights were erected along South Main Street and Washington Avenue; the 6th street crossing was opened; Washington to Oregon; city brochures were printed; the council, in cooperation with the Planning Commission, backed and

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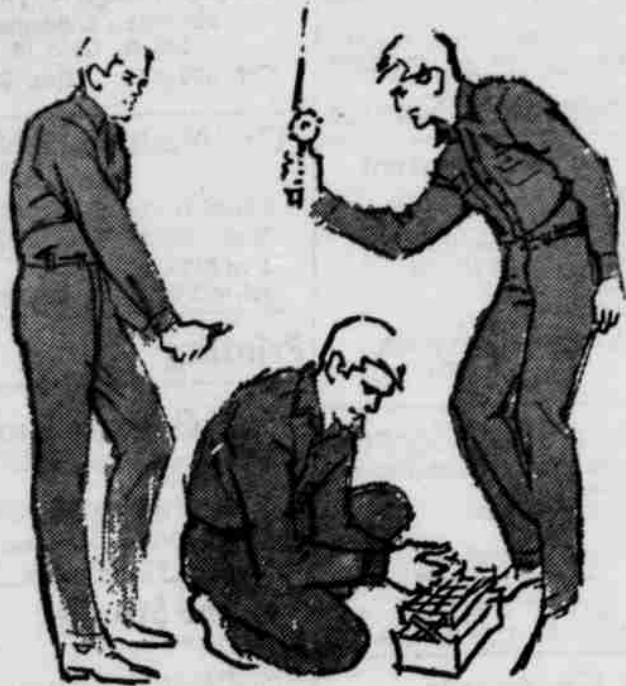
