Two firms may share construction work on the projects of the new Boardman townsite as a result of bids opened at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the city hall. John R. Kelteh of Pasco bid \$359,929.05 on the paving, railroad overpass structure, water distribution system and sanitary sewer system. This was low bid on these phases of the project.

Mann Construction Co. of Redmond was low bidder on the pressure line and pond for the sewer system at \$64,599.67.

In all, 11 bids were received. Before contracts are awarded, the engineers for the city, the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers and the State Sanitary Authority must check all items.

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Wheat Men Back Parity Bill; Set 8th Grade Tour

\$47,000, they maintain a Washington office and are concerned with programs for the wheat grower on the national level. Morgan also reported on the Wheat League's interest in the McGovern bill which asks for 100% parity on domestic consumption. Under the present wheat bill farmers are receiving 71.7% of parity.

He estimated that the McGovern bill would increase farm income \$250 to \$300 million without additional cost to the treasury of the U. S.

Don Peterson reported on activities of the Pacific Northwest Grain and Grain Products association. Organized in 1948, its prime purpose is to work for fair and equitable rates in transportation. It has saved Oregon producers \$1,240,000 per year in holding down a 7c per hundred weight increase which is proposed by the Interstate Commerce Commission, Peterson said.
