

Funeral Services Held For Laura Taylor, 72

BOARDMAN — Funeral services were held Tuesday for Laura Evaline Taylor, 72, who died February 5 at the Good Shepherd hospital in Hermiston after an illness of several years. Mrs. Taylor was born February 9, 1893 in Wentworth, Mo., the daughter of Barney and Emma Spillman. She was married to Algerman F. Taylor November 21, 1928, and they came to Oregon in January, 1931 and lived at Kinzua until 1943, when they came to Boardman where they have lived since.

Survivors besides the widower at home are sons William Goen of Klamath Falls; Herschel Goen of Portland; David E. (Nick) Taylor of Portland; and Robert Taylor of Boardman; daughters Mrs. Leonard (Dora) Bock of Seattle, Wn., and Mrs. Mary David of Salem; three sisters, Lucinda Taylor of Michigan, and two in Missouri; also 25 grandchildren and 19 great-grandchildren.

Services were held at the Boardman Community church with Rev. Herman R. Burg officiating. Burial was in Boardman Riverview cemetery. Burns Mortuary of Hermiston was in charge.

Engineers Present Contract For City Hall Construction

At the postponed meeting of the Boardman City Council last Thursday night Dewey West was authorized to execute the contract with Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merryfield, engineering firm, for the design of the new city hall and park. It is hoped it will be completed by March 15, and advertised for bids by April 15. The bids will be opened May 15, and construction to start about June 1. It should be completed within 120 days.

In other action the council passed a resolution for West to make formal application to purchase the Bureau of Land Management land which will be used for the west residential area in the new Boardman town-site.

Reappointments to the city planning commission are as follows: Vernon Russell, Evelyn Black, Harold Baker, all for four terms. Wally Hendrix was appointed as park and buildings supervisor. Other reappointments included: Vernon Russell, police; Seth Russell, irrigation; Joe Tatone, sanitation; Zearl Gillespie, water and fire department; Ed Kuhn, streets.

Dave Potter, county school superintendent, Howard Cleveland and Ralph Skoubo were present to present the school relocation schedule report as follows: April 15, 1965, the preliminary plan will be ready for discussion and revision; May 15, the completion of the preliminary design; July 15, the design memo will go to Washington, D. C. for approval; March 1, 1966, the Corps of Engineers' final approval will be made; September 1, 1966 is the final date to begin construction; September 1, 1967 the school will be ready for use.

Water Disinfectant Fills Need as Sanitizer
Will a clothes dryer kill bacteria left in sheets and mattress pads? It helps, but bacteria are in the fabric and the articles in the dryer do not all reach the same temperature at the same time. Also, articles are sometimes removed before they are really dry to avoid wrinkling or shrinkage.

The best way to sanitize clothes, whether necessary because of flood or illness, is to use a disinfectant such as chlorine bleach in the wash water. Do not use this for wool, silk, spandex, and some resin finished fabrics.

REFERRED TO THE PEOPLE OF MORROW COUNTY BY THE MORROW COUNTY COURT.

1. A MEASURE AUTHORIZING THE COUNTY COURT TO LEVY AND COLLECT TAXES IN THE AMOUNT OF \$125,000 ANNUALLY WHICH SHALL BE OUTSIDE THE LIMITATIONS IMPOSED BY ARTICLE XI, SECTION II, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF OREGON, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR STARTING JULY 1, 1965 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 1966, AND EACH YEAR THEREAFTER FOR A TOTAL PERIOD OF THREE (3) SUCCESSIVE YEARS, SAID FUNDS TO BE USED TO CONSTRUCT, IMPROVE, MAINTAIN, REPLACE AND REPAIR COUNTY ROADS. PURPOSE: To authorize the County Court of Morrow County, State of Oregon, to levy and collect taxes in the amount of \$125,000 annually, which shall be outside the limitation imposed by Article XI, Section II, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, on all taxable property in the County of Morrow, State of Oregon, for the fiscal year starting July 1, 1965 and ending June 30, 1966, and each year thereafter for a total of three (3) successive years to more adequately provide funds with which the County of Morrow can construct, improve, maintain, repair and replace County Roads.
