## Annual Report Shows Loans Up

In the counties of Umatilla, Wallowa, Morrow, Union, and Grant, agriculture is big business, with increasingly heavy requirements of working capital for the individual ranches. This is the conclusion to be drawn from the financial report of Pendleton Production Credit association presented to its members at their annual meeting.

During 1964, crop and livestock loans to members of the association totaled more than \$5 million. This represents a gain of over \$700,000 during the past year. Proceeds of the loans were used to finance equipment, buildings, stock and month-to-month operation of 473 members engaged in row crop farming, wheat ranches and cattle and sheep spreads.

Assets of Pendleton Production Credit association as of December 31, 1964, and amounted to \$3,794,986. Capital stock ownership by association members now totals \$380,955. Accumulated earnings, retained as liquid reserves, amount to \$281,130.

Two members of the board of directors were re-elected for another term. They are Clifford Johnson of Wallowa, who completed the unexpired term of the late Charles F. Litch, and Robert Rothrock of Adams. Holdover members are Myron C. Hug, Summerville, R. G. Saylor, Echo, and Paul Hiesler of Heppner.

President is R. G. Saylor, Myron C. Hug is vice-president, and J. C. Southern is secretary-treasurer and manager. Offices of the association are maintained at 702 S. W. Dorion Street, Pendleton, and 102 N. E. First Street, Enterprise.

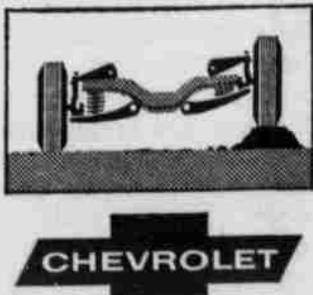
