

Irrigon Council Plans Building Of New Firehouse

IRRIGON — Members of the Irrigon fire board met with the city council last Tuesday night, to discuss plans for the new firehouse to be constructed this summer.

It is anticipated that the new building will also house the city hall as well as the fire trucks and facilities. After much deliberation, it was decided that the best solution would be for the fireboard to lease space to the city on a yearly basis rather than to make a permanent agreement that would be binding on both groups.

In other council business, Harry Snyder stated that some of the businesses were complaining that trees on the south of the highway were blocking their advertising signs, and asked that a letter be written to the Oregon State Highway Department requesting that trees growing on their right-of-way be cut down. Max McKay stated that Ed Pelissier, fire chief at Grandma, had volunteered to meet with the Irrigon Fire Department and interested persons to lecture on atomic fire fighting.

The Irrigon Landfill also came up for discussion, and Mayor Wilson stated that the commission was going to request more funds, as it is not operating satisfactorily under the present financial setup. At the present time, Morrow and Umatilla counties, McNary township and the cities of Umatilla and Irrigon contribute equal amounts of revenue annually. This amount will be increased for the coming fiscal year, and Mayor Wilson stated if any of the participating parties pulled out, it would dissolve the Landfill Commission, which could result in the landfill being closed, and the gates locked by the Health Department. Residents of this area would then be obliged to use the fill at Hermiston.

No action is planned by the council until after a meeting with the county court at Heppner on Wednesday, March 3, 1 p.m. All interested residents are urged to attend this meeting. Landfill hours for summer months are from 2:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Wednesdays and Saturdays, beginning March 3.

College to Start Courses Here

Blue Mountain Community College has announced three evening courses, starting in March.

Basic Bishop Sewing will meet Wednesday evenings, starting March 10. Sylvia Smith will instruct the course which emphasizes techniques of clothing construction. Fabric handling, shrinking, stretching, pressing and straightening of the fabrics will be stressed. The commercial appearance is strived for in the construction of simple garments. The fee for the ten-week course will be \$12.50. Meeting time has been set at 7 to 10 p.m. during the ten weeks.

Basic Design will be instructed by Cal Hempel. This art course covers the study of the elements in basic design, the use of lines, curves, shapes, and geometrical solids, and emphasizes composition. The starting date and meeting time will be identical to the sewing class. The tuition is also \$12.50.

Farm Law will start Tuesday, March 2, at 7:30 p.m. This course will meet two hours each Tuesday evening for ten weeks. It is designed to acquaint farmers with a legal aspect than can be applied to property ownership, business transactions, liabilities, and rights. Emphasis will be placed on determining when the farmer should secure professional legal counsel. \$8.50 is the fee charge for Farm Law. Mr. Joseph Baillie will be the instructor.
