## Athena Edges Lone; Cards Top Stanfield

Lone High dropped a notch in the Umatilla-Morrow League ranks with a split of its week-end basketball games, downing Stanfield 54-49 there Friday and succumbing to the McEwen High Scotties at Athena in a real thriller, 68-66 at lone Saturday.

The Cards started out in a hurry and grabbed a 14-10 first quarter lead over Stanfield, lone's 38% field goal shooting gave them a 10 point lead at the half, and the Cards were never in serious trouble after that, lone hit 18 of 25 at the free throw line and the Tigers had seven of 13. Stanfield shot a fair 30% from the field, lone ran its lead to 12 at the end of the third period, 45-33, and Coach Gene Dockter cleared the lone bench. The Tigers drew to within five but that was the closest they could get.

Coach Dockter praised Stan Holstein for an excellent floor game offensively and defensively and gave credit to Mark Halvorsen for a good game on the boards as he had 14 rebounds. Stan Holstein had 23, Wes Holstein added 12 and Joe Halvorsen made with 10. T. Tucker had 11 for Stanfield.

Lack of rebounding strength hurt the Cards as McEwen pulled down 45 rebounds to lone's 22 grabs. The Cards hit a marvelous 51% from the field while the Scotties shot a 37% field game. The lone club had 12 of 21 at the charity stripe and the Athena team shot at a 500 clip from the line, hitting on 12 of 24 attempts.

Lone was two points down when the second stanza started but soon were riding on an eight point cushion. The Scotties cut it to three but lone led at the half, 35-32. The game was still a thriller as the two foes fought to 52-52 third quarter standoff and the final period started.

The Cards led through much of the last quarter. They still had a one point advantage with only 30 seconds to go and had possession of the ball. Jay Ball was fouled but he failed to hit on a one and one situation. Tyler Hansel scored for McEwen to go in front, lone had time for another shot but failed to make good. A foul on lone gave the ball to Hansel at the free throw line, and he promptly swished it for the Scotties, final two-point lead. The Cards took a desperation shot but missed and the game was over. Stan Holstein capped a fine week-end with 26 tallies.

## Mustangs Win Two 'Must' Games; Now Stand Alone in Third Place

There's still a chance. That's the word at Heppner High school this week after the Mustangs claimed two basketball victories over the week-end to keep the Heppner boys in the race for a Greater Oregon League playoff berth at La Grande March 12 and 13.

The Mustangs took both of the "must" contests, clobbering Wah-tonka High there Friday night, 68-53, and winning here Saturday evening against the Prospectors of John Day, 63-48. One more game remains for the Mustangs, that being this Friday night against the Pilot Rock Rockets here.

The Mustangs were one down at the half but they did not let this stop them as they eliminated the Eagles from the race. Heppner took a 16-11 first quarter advantage but Wah-tonka came back to lead, 26-25. Heppner doubled the Eagles' scoring output in the third period and then widened their command to the final margin. The game had a total of 42 personals and Heppner cashed in for 28 points at the line, while Wah-tonka collected 15.

Heppner also held the edge from the field, garnering 20 to the home team's 19. Gene Heliker had 13 for the Mustangs, with nine of these coming at the charity stripe on 10 tries. Stu Dick had 11 and Wayne Evans came off the bench to score 10. Coach Bob Clough boasted a lineup with three guards in it to start the game but soon switched to his regular starters.

Saturday night's game was a real crowd-pleaser as the Mustangs played fine defensive ball. Not one of the Prospectors scored in double figures while Heppner had three big scorers in the column. Carl Bauman poured in 16 points.

Heppner led in both departments again Saturday with 18 fielders and 27 free shots. They held Grant Union to 13 field goals and 22 tallies from the charity stripe. A total of 50 fouls was called on the two teams and Grant Union had 29 of these plus two technicals for a total of 31.

Carl Bauman started things out in the first period for the Mustangs as he scored on two jumpers from the side of the key and a tip-in for six. Grant Union was on the short side of a 12-7 score when the first quarter ended, and they immediately set to work to slim the margin. Brad Ward repeated Bauman's feat with six points in the second period and the Mustangs found themselves with only a two-point margin at the half, 27-25.

The two foes battled back and forth through the third stanza but the Mustangs finally managed to pull away and Bill Snyder capped a Heppner scoring drive with a driving lay-in and the home team had a 43-31 lead. The John Day club pulled back to within 10 at 45-35 but they never could come close again as the Mustangs pulled away for the win.

### Jayvees Lose Two On 2-Point Edges

Playing without forward Jim Jacobs, Heppner High's jayvee basketball team lost two games last week-end, each by two points.

Wah-tonka's Eagles won there in a rough contest with only a few fouls being called, 47-45. The Heppner boys played host to the Grant Union Prospectors Saturday night, and the visitors made it two over Heppner this season with a 35-33 victory.

Wah-tonka came back from a 33-24 halftime deficit to grab the win from the junior Mustangs with a fine defensive fourth quarter, holding Heppner high to two points while scoring 13 themselves.

Brown had 12 for Heppner, Gray collected 11 and Dennis O'Donnell chipped in 10. Brice had 16 for the Eagles.

A poor final period hurt the jayvees Saturday night again as the Mustangs had a 26-25 advantage as the period started. The Prospectors scored 10 points and held the home team to seven. Heppner outscored Grant Union the first half but the John Day club fired in 23 points in the last half.

The game had a rousing finish as the lead changed hands often in the last stanza. Steve Pettyjohn, up from the Heppner Frosh for the game, tied it up for the last time. Grant Union came rushing back to get two. The Mustangs failed to make a last ditch basket and the visitors went to the showers with the victory. Brown again led the home team with 11 tallies and Gray added 8.

## Frosh Five Wins 2 or 3 on Road

Heppner Frosh won two of three basketball games on the road last week, downing Condon Thursday, February 11, 56-51, losing to Riverside Jayvees February 12, 48-34, and whipping the lone Jayvees, 46-36, Friday on the lone high court.

Condon started out with a rush and led at the end of the first quarter 13-5. The young Mustangs came right back with a 17-point second quarter and were down by only two at the half, 26-24. The Frosh came out in the third with their biggest spurt, adding 18 more tallies and led at the end of three, 42-30.

Heppner found themselves up against a big Riverside team but they didn't let this fact bother them as the Frosh took an early command with a 10-8 first period advantage. The Mustangs were hurt by foul trouble in the second quarter and the Pirates took advantage and took the lead at the half, 25-19. Tremendous defense helped the hosts in the third stanza and they stretched their lead to 12 at 34-22. The two foes traded buckets in the last quarter but Riverside claimed the victory. Hall had 17 for Heppner.

Heppner came back from a 1-point intermission deficit at lone to win their sixth game against three defeats. The Frosh

took an early lead at 9-3 but the Jayvees doubled the Mustangs second quarter output for a 17-16 halftime lead. The Frosh boasted fine shooting from the field in the third period and had a 34-31 lead at that point. A fine defensive effort gave the young Mustangs a big lead and Coach Don McClure ran in his reserves to finish out the game. Dave Hall was big gun for Heppner, leading them with 17.
