Mustangs Lose 2 But Push Rivals

age while Dayton hit the same number on 51 attempts for 388. Against Phoenix, which had lost to Reedsport in an upset Monday, 36 to 54, the Mustangs faced a team undefeated in regular season and one with six men topping six feet. Their Dan Beeson, who scored 30 points against Reedsport, towers 6-6, while John Barker, a first team all-stater, is 6-3. Both Eugene Hill and Tom Leedy are 6-2. This height advantage gave the boards to Phoenix, which was to lead in rebounds in the Tuesday afternoon consolation game, 44 to 20. But after their shaky start, which found them off shooting form, the Mustangs didn't give the Pirates anything else and staged one of their last half rushes that probably earned lasting respect from their taut-ed opponents.

Heppner Trails, 23-10

As against Dayton, it appeared at the start of the Phoenix game that the Morrow county lads

would be severely spanked. Doherty picked up five points in the first period, three on free throws, Bauman got three points and Evans tallied on one bucket, but the 10 was all the Mustangs could manage.

Meanwhile, the Pirates were running wild. Beeson, Barker, Paul Diederich, Jim Construk, Ken Hawkins and Leedy all got into the act, led by Construk and Beeson, each with six, and their combined total of 23 points had Heppner 13 points in arrears. But abruptly the Mustangs got their bearings and came back to outscore the Jackson county tall firs, 25 to 22, in the second quarter and pull up three notches by halftime, 43 to 35. Three Heppner lads got two field goals in the period, Evans, Bauman and Doherty. Snyder, Bruce Spencer and Heliker each counted one field goal, and Evans, Heliker and Spencer each potted two free throws. Tim Driscoll hit his first point of the tournament in the period on one of two free throws.

Barker Drops Bomb

Hawkins, Beeson and Barker kept the Phoenix five going but Barker, the all-stater, was yet to drop his bomb on the Mustangs, that came in the third quarter. He tallied 13 points in the third on six field goals and a free throw. This was the bulge that was to save the day for Phoenix. Heppner kept peppering away with Doherty and Evans especially finding the range, but Phoenix, with Barker's boost, tallied 23 in the period while Heppner made 20. This put the courageous Mustangs right back where they were at the end of the first quarter, 13 points behind. At one time in the third, the Blue and Gold trailed by 20, 61-41 but it was 68-55 at the quarter's end.

With three minutes to play and 15 points behind, 80-65, the never-quit kids turned on the pressure even greater with their full court press and speeded up their razzle dazzle floor play.

Heliker Tallies Ten

Sparking the late effort was Heliker with a fine scoring display, making five field goals in the final stanza. Doherty hit a layin and Driscoll and Snyder each calmly sank two free throws which brought them to the three-point deficit, 81 to 78, with 10 seconds to play. Heppner still had one more chance. They had the ball as the final count-down ticked away. Dick made a gallant try for a last ditch bucket but it missed and the game was over.

Barker's 27 was high for the night but Doherty and Evans each had 17 for Heppner, while Heliker had 16 and Bauman was also in double figures with 10. Construk was second high for the winners with 17. Beeson, who had potted the 30 against Reedsport, was held to 12 by the Mustangs.

Teams Hot in Shooting

Both teams blazed the net in this one. Heppner hitting 28 of 66 for 424 and Phoenix making 33 of 74 for 433. On the free throw line Heppner had 22 of 30 while Phoenix tallied 15 of 24. Heliker's total of 32 in two games led Heppner's tournament scoring. Second was Evans with 26, and third was Doherty with 25. Others were Bauman 19, Snyder 11, Dick 8, Spencer 7, Hoskins 4, Driscoll 4, and Jacobs failed to score although playing good ball in both games.

Athletic Director Pete Glennie who called Wednesday to tell about the games said that all boys performed remarkably well in the tournament. After downing Heppner, Phoenix smacked Myrtle Point in consolation action, 86 to 53. If comparative scores mean anything, this would tend to indicate that the Mustangs hit the tough bracket in the tourney, but even so gave their opponents full measure of basketball. Dayton went on to shellack Reedsport, 71 to 58, to gain the championship game against Pleasant Hill.
