## Students Respond On Wheat Contest

Oregon high school students are responding in large numbers to the annual newspaper article contest sponsored by the Oregon Wheat Growers League. Melvin Pace, president, reported this week.

Pace predicted that, based on early returns, this year's contest, sixth annual competition held by the Wheat League, will exceed the number of essays submitted in previous years by a wide margin. Closing date for the contest is May 1.

"Advantages of wheat in the Everyday Diet" and "Production and Marketing of Oregon Wheat" are the two subjects selected by the Wheat League for this year's contest, Pace said. All students in grades nine through twelve, with the exception of those whose parents are officers of the Wheat Growers League or the Wheat Commission, are eligible to choose one of the topics.

Cash awards will be made for the winning entries. Pace announced, with \$75 going to the author of the best article, and \$50, \$35 and \$15 prizes for the second, third and fourth place entries.

Contest information and rules have been mailed to all Oregon high schools, and additional entry blanks or further information may be obtained by writing to the Oregon Wheat Growers League, P. O. Box 400, Pendleton, Oregon.
