

Final Tributes Paid to Petteys, lone Pioneer Son

IONE — George Ammanuel (Mannie) Petteys, 83, passed away at Pioneer Memorial hospital in Heppner on Saturday, March 27, after a long illness which had kept him hospitalized for over a year.

Funeral services were held at the lone United Church of Christ on Monday afternoon with Rev. Walter B. Crowell officiating. Mrs. F. T. Martin was organist and Mrs. Fred Hoskins Jr. was soloist. Pallbearers, (all great-nephews of the deceased) were Robert and Bill Rietmann and Keith Rea of Ione; Gerald Rea, Condon; Dallas Rea, Pendleton; and Francis Rea, Heppner. Interment was in the Petteys cemetery with Sweeney Mortuary in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Petteys was born to pioneer parents, Ammanuel and Catherine (Geinger) Petteys on January 25, 1880, at the family homestead three miles south of Ione, near Ibesa Creek Junction. His father had filed claim on the farm in 1868 and had a stage station for the stage coaches going from The Dalles to the John Day country. The place was known as Petteysville for many years and the elder Mr. Petteys was postmaster.

Mannie, as he was called by all who knew him, spent his entire life on the family farm and operated it for many years. About 1967 he sold it to Mr. and Mrs. Marlon Palmer. He never married. After his retirement, he made his home with his sister, Mrs. Edith Nicholson in Ione.

Survivors besides Mrs. Nicholson are two sisters, Mrs. Arvilla Swanson of Ione and Mrs. Thelma Cosman of Los Angeles, Calif., and many nieces and nephews.

While the Viking pitcher had 15 strikeouts, O'Donnell had five and Bauman fanned two. Lewis paced the winners with a 2-for-3 performance at the plate.

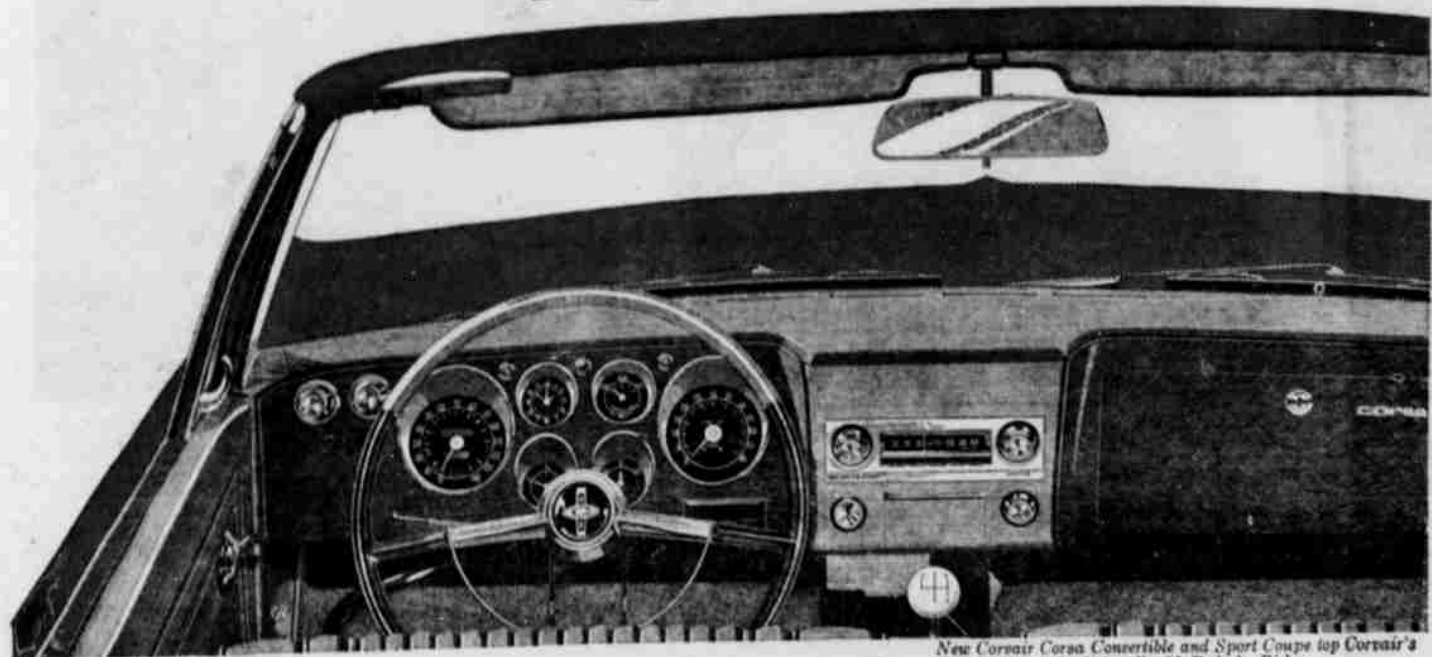
