Cowboy-Airman Ends Long Trek

George Cooper, former airman at the Condon Air Station, 626th Radar Squadron, has completed a 700-mile trek by horseback to his home at Yerington, Nev., from Condon, proving to his scoffing buddies that it could be done.

Word of the successful completion of the trip comes via Mrs. Leo Crabtree of lone, from whom Cooper bought the horse to make the trip. The 24-year-old ex-serviceman arrived at Yerington on March 24, taking two months and three days to make it. He averaged 23 miles per day, and his best day covered 55 miles from the Bill DeLong Ranch near the Jackson Mountains to Inlay, Nev., north of Winnemucca.

His arrival was acclaimed in his hometown paper with a three column spread and picture. Mrs. Crabtree has a clipping that he sent.

Cooper, who was discharged early this year, decided on the venture as a result of repartee with his airman buddies, most of whom came from the east. The young airman said that he could walk all the way home to Nevada and never meet an unfriendly person. One airman rejoined that it couldn't be done even by horseback, and this was a challenge that George felt moved to accept.

He bought the saddle horse from the Crabtrees, acquired a pack animal and set out on January 15, figuring to travel the back country. Right away, he found weather to be against him. Heavy snows blocked his

route and floods had taken their toll. His Welsh pack pony became a cankerous and George left him behind.

Floods delayed Cooper at Kimberly, but by mid-February he had reached Burns. He worked on the Pons Ranch there for a time and shortly after, when his sore showed signs of lameness, he traded it for another horse by giving an added \$50.

Radio reports kept the populace well-informed of his progress, and some came out to greet him. One miserable day of traveling was in weather of 10 degrees below zero.

Stevens Mountains proved one of the outstanding sights on the trip, rising 9000 feet from the desert floor.

Cooper figured the cost of his trip at about \$500. He said that he was overstocked with gear and provisions and left considerable along the route. While resting at one point beside his horse, a California traveler came along and took his picture as a "typical Nevada cowboy resting after a long day's work."

The tourist was chagrined when he learned that George had had little previous experience with horses.

In completing the trip, Cooper figures he has proved his point that westerners are truly friendly and helpful. While at Condon, he worked on the station paper, "The Scope," and was a familiar figure at the Gazette-Times once per month.
