

Cowboy Trackmen Edge Mustangs With 66-65 Win

If there's one thing Heppner High's track team is weak on, it's the sprints. This was evident as the A-2 Mustangs traveled to Prineville Friday to take on the A-1 Cowboys in a meet that went down to the final event before it was decided. With the Heppner cindermen holding a 65-61 lead, the relay went to the Prineville team, and with it five points and the victory, 66-65.

The Mustang weakness in the sprints showed up highly in the meet as the Cowboys swept all three places in the 100-yard dash. Prineville High also took two of the three possible places in the high jump, broad jump, and pole vault. However, the HHS tracksters, long on endurance, took seven of nine places in the mile, two-mile, and 880.

Both Tim Driscoll and John Wagenblast were double winners for the Mustangs with Driscoll winning the high hurdles in 17.7 and the 220 in 25.6; Wagenblast taking the mile in 5:07.1 and the 880 in 2:13.4. Bill McLeod, entered in the jayvee mile, surprised the field by taking third in the varsity run.

Mustang Trackmen Defeat Rockets In Dual Meet Here

Tim Driscoll, fresh from Heppner High's basketball wars, lost no time getting into the swing of track as he broke the school broad jump record in the first meet of the year against Pilot Rock here Wednesday, March 31.

Driscoll won the event with a leap of 20 ft. 11 in., bettering the old mark of 20-8 by three inches.

Heppner won nine of 15 first places in the meet to come out on top, 82 to 49. Driscoll took two firsts, winning in the high hurdles as well as the broad jump, and Ken Morgan copped one first and shared another, tying in the 100 yard dash with Earl Perkins and winning the low hurdles. Other first place finishers for the Mustangs were Jim Jacobs, shotput; Simon Winters, javelin; Dean Robinson, 440; and Allyn Witherrite, 880.

He was put out later trying to steal home, but DeVae made up for it as he got a three-bagger to score Bauer. Hermiston got one run in the third and then added two more insurance tallies in the fourth. The Mustangs got their lone score in the fourth when Bill Snyder scored on an infield hit. Sherrill McDonald got the one Heppner hit in the fifth frame with a shot through the box.

Heppner outhit the Pirates at Boardman, four to three, but the Riverside diamond crew took advantage of four errors and three walks to put together a six-run third inning and the Heppner club couldn't overcome the margin.

Stuart Dick turned in a 2-for-4 plate performance and Carl Bauman hit 2-for-3 at the plate for HHS.

The Mustangs gained sweet revenge and at the same time evened up their season at 2-2 in Saturday's twin bill.

Pitcher Bill Snyder, who got only one strikeout in the first game against Umatilla, had all the support he needed from Heppner's strong infield. He took advantage of it, and allowed only three hits in gaining a shutout. Ron Barber, chucking for the Vikings, fanned 10 Heppner batsmen but it wasn't enough as the Mustangs took the win, 2-0. Rog Leonnig paced the Mustangs at the plate, getting 1 for 2.

Bauman hurled two-hit ball in the second game, giving up only two walks in the seven-inning affair. The Heppner bats came alive in the third inning, after the Pirates had taken a 2-0 lead. The home club connected on three hits for a four-run inning to take the lead at 4-2. Riverside tied it up in the top of the fifth on Steve Partlow's single and an error on Dick but the Mustangs followed with back-to-back doubles by Bill Snyder and Rick Johnston and they had the final margin, 5-1.

Lost Infielders Hurt Cardinal Baseball Outlook

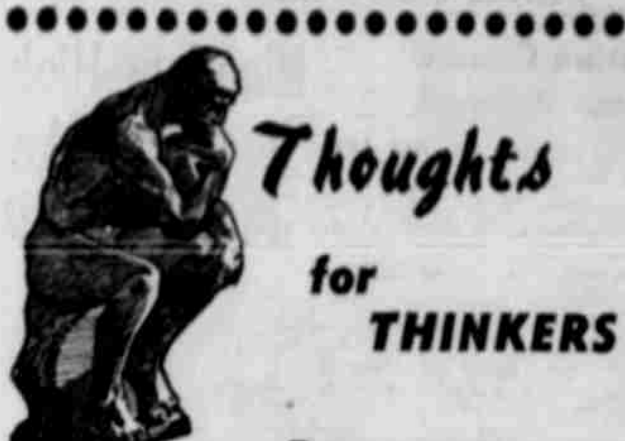
