Jaycees Propose New Street Signs

A cooperative project to provide new street signs in Heppner was proposed to the city council Monday night by the Junior Chamber of Commerce with Dave Haddock, Jaycee chairman of the project, acting as spokesman.

He said that the Jaycees would install the necessary signs around town if the city will pay the cost of obtaining them. The organization has conducted a survey and estimates that 68 signs are needed at a cost of \$438.85. They would be porcelain-covered metal and enamel embossed.

Mayor Al Lamb and the council expressed appreciation for the interest and said that the council will study the matter.

Herman Green, owner of Heppner Garbage Disposal, appeared at the meeting and asked permission for an increase in the minimum monthly charge for garbage service to \$2.00 from the present \$1.50 for collection of a 30-gallon container per week.

The increase was unanimously approved, and a new 2-year contract between the city and Green will be executed incorporating the change.

A contract with the rural fire district was also presented to the city but was not signed, pending review by City Attorney Bob Abrams who was not able to be present at the meeting.

The council authorized an offer to property owners with bridges damaged in floods on Cannon street for the city to restore the bridges on a contract basis. If agreeable to the owners, the contract would cover a time period not to exceed 10 years at 3% interest. City Supt. Vic Goshens said that the two bridges could be restored for \$300, and it was agreed to offer the contract for this amount.

At the request of Chief of Police Dean Gilman, the council agreed to pay \$135 severance pay to Officer Pat Mollahan who retired following his shift Sunday after long service with the city. Nick Gray has been obtained as a replacement and is now working on a trial basis, the Chief said.

First city budget meeting was set for Friday, April 23, with the second to follow early in May.

Building permits were issued as follows: Michael Gray, new residence at 540 W. Morgan, \$20,000; Charles Phegley, siding, finish room and add driveway at 520 S. Main, \$2500; and Armond Britt, add porch on trailer at 235 Water, \$100.

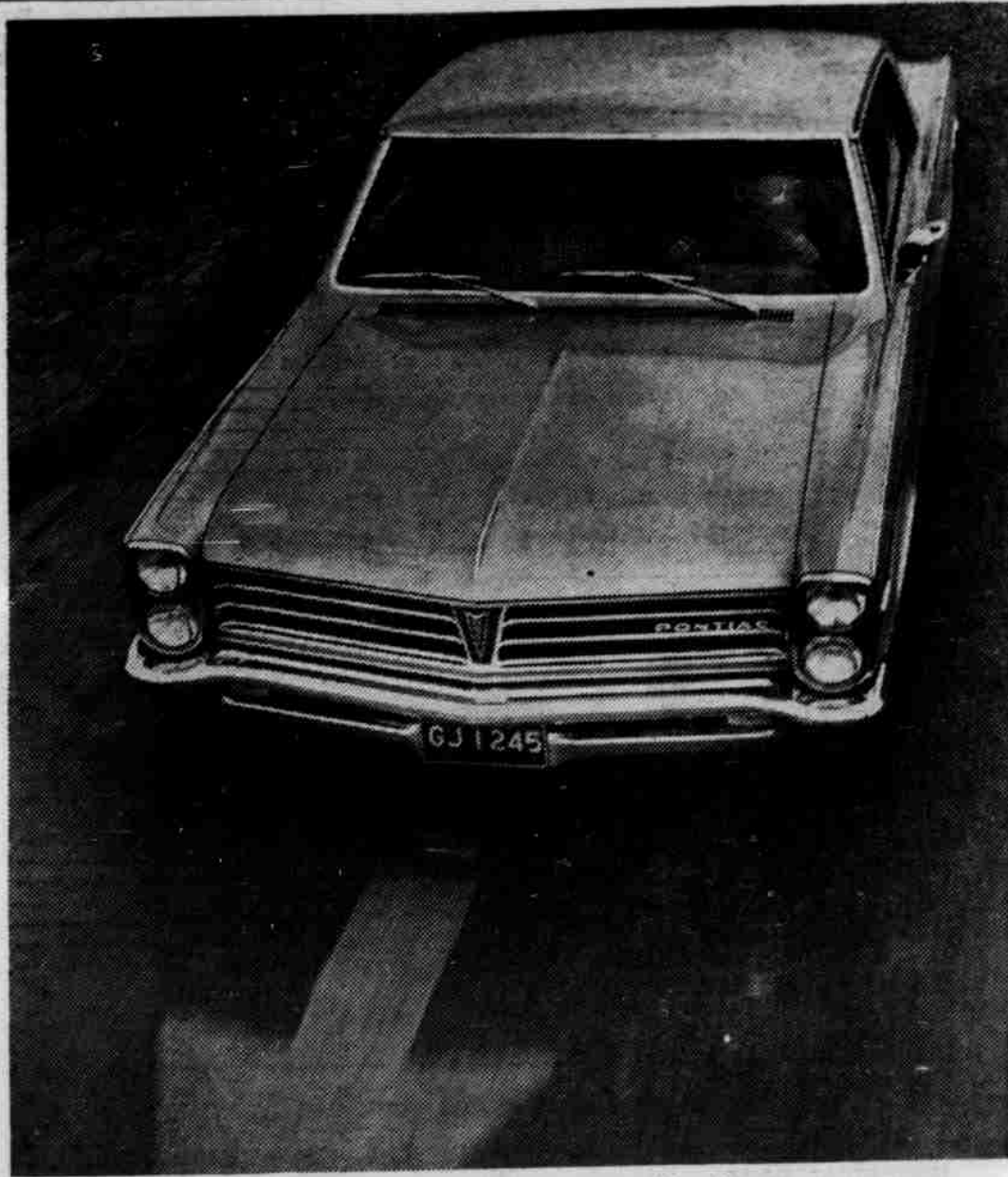
