Office and City Face Damage Suit

Susan Marie Valentine, guardian of Tana Valentine has filed complaint in Morrow county circuit court seeking \$25,000 general damages as a result of an auto accident that occurred January 20, 1963, in which the complaint alleges, Tana Valentine suffered permanent injuries.

Named as defendants in the action are Pat Mollahan, who was a city officer at the time of the accident, and the City of Heppner. The accident occurred at the junction of the Willow Creek highway and Riverdale Avenue, just north of town.

Miss Valentine was a passenger in a car involved in a collision with the city police car. Officer Mollahan was driving the police car.

In the complaint it is alleged that the officer failed to stop and failed to yield the right of way. It is alleged that Miss Valentine suffered wrenched muscles, ligaments, dislocation of a shoulder, and other injuries.

Holstein Brothers Lead Statistics For Lone Hoopers

Brothers Stan and Wes Holstein led in season's statistics for the lone high school basketball team, according to figures published by the school paper, "The Cardinal."

Stan was top scorer for the team, averaging 15 points per contest in 23 games. He scored 336 points on 134 field goals and 68 free throws. Second was Mark Halvorsen with a 12-point average on a total of 104 field goals and 64 free throws, or 272 total points. Mark's brother, Joe Halvorsen, was third with a 10.5 average. His 238 points came on 76 field goals and 86 free throws.

Jay Ball was fourth high scorer with 183 points on 79 field goals and 25 free throws for 183 and an 8.2 average. Wes Holstein was fifth with 62 field goals and 38 free throws for 164 and a 7.4 average.

Others were Leon Magill with 36 points on 14 and 8; Bob Ewert, 24 and 10 and 4; Virgil Morgan, 14 on 6 and 2; Rod Linnell, 11 on 5 and 1; Bob Baker, 10 on 2 and 6; Chris Lovgren, 8 on 3 and 2.

Wes Holstein led the team in field goal percentage with 40.5%, making 62 of 153 attempts. Joe Halvorsen was second in accuracy with 39.6 on 76 of 192, and Stan Holstein was third with 38.6 on 134 of 347 attempts. Leon Magill shot at a 35.9 clip, Mark Halvorsen at 35.7 and Jay Ball at 34.1.

Stan Holstein was the most accurate on the free throw line with 66.7% and Wes Holstein was second with 64.4. Ball hit at a 62.5 clip from the charity stripe. Joe Halvorsen made 54.8% of his tries, Mark Halvorsen, 54.7 and Leon Magill 36.4.

Before going east, Rev. Boschee lived in Milton Freewater and his wife was a resident of La Grande.

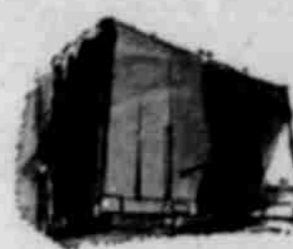
