

Trees to Beautify New Boardman

BOARDMAN—The U. S. Corps of Engineers has agreed to furnish 250 trees eight to ten feet high for the new town of Boardman. The cost will be \$2500.

This was announced at the regular monthly meeting of the City Council last week. This was included in the contract modification of resolution No. 7-19-53, and was recorded in the minutes.

The Oregon League of Cities has agreed to assist in the codification of the compilation and adoption of the new city ordinance.

Tentative dates for the city budget meetings are April 21, May 4 and 25.

Burt Anderson, residential engineer of Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merrifield of Seattle, Wash., was present at the meeting. Coming here from Anchorage, Alaska, Anderson will inspect all construction in the new city. He and Mrs. Anderson moved here recently. He has also traveled in South America.

Dick Krebs of Cecil is vice-president; Joe Tatone, 2nd vice-president; Al Lamb of Heppner, secretary; Gar Swanson of Ione, treasurer. Wayne Cordes from the firm of White, Sutherland and White, Portland, is budget officer.

Rupert Kennedy director of Mid-Columbia Planning Council, gave a report on the six county planning study, and that part of the six counties that encompassed the port district.
