**Irrigon Residents Seek Injunction On School Site**

Port funds may be jeopardized. Plaintiffs in the suit further state that the action of the board on March 17 was invalid because the meeting was not properly called, since no prior written notice, setting forth the purpose of the meeting, was sent or delivered to all the members as required by law; and that prior to the meeting several board members met in informal discussion and consented to the measure in advance of the called meeting.

In this course of action, the complaint alleges, the board "utterly failed to consider the reports and recommendations of the State Department of Education, its own engineers and reports of educational experts employed by it."

The motion for the restraining order asks the directors to show cause why the temporary injunction should not be issued to restrain the defendants from establishing a high school on the Boardman site.

At the regular board meeting Tuesday night in the courthouse, a delegation from Irrigon was present and asked to make statements to the board. Attorney Bob Abrams declined to be present at this proceeding since it would be unethical for him to be a party to conferring with the plaintiffs without their being represented by their legal counsel.

However, the board went into executive session with the Irrigon delegation present and without Attorney Abrams. Supt. David Potter later announced that the board had permitted two of the delegation to speak, that it had listened to the statements without reaction nor comment, and that copies of the statements would be made available to the board and to the legal counsel.

**Forestry Sticker On Sale at Office**

Recreation - conservation annual stickers are now on sale at the office of the Heppner Ranger district, Umatilla National Forest, the office reported Wednesday.

The sticker, new this year, is an annual permit which entitles the holder and all occupants of a private automobile to enter, for purposes of recreation, designated National Forest areas, National Park Service areas, National Wildlife Refuges, and other Federal recreation areas where an entrance fee is required.

Cost is \$7, and the sticker may be used for as many visits as the holder makes to any or all of such areas. It is valid from April 1, 1965 to March 31, 1966.

In lieu of the sticker, a single day entry permit may be purchased for use on one day by each person 16 or over who enters a designated Forest Service recreation area. However, these will not be on sale until May 28.

The forestry office here will sell the stickers from 8 to 5 on week days and they are available from Mrs. Paul (Gladys) Jones or Mrs. Herb (Betty) Hamilton. No provision has been made for accepting orders by mail or personal checks.

In this area, the fee will be charged for the Bull Prairie recreation grounds for camping, picnicking or fishing.

Proceeds of the land and water conservation fund from the sale will be used during the next 25 years to provide additional Federal recreation areas and to assist states in planning, acquiring and developing outdoor recreation areas and facilities for public use.

**Board Approves Two New Teachers**

Contracts of two new teachers were approved for the Morrow county schools at the meeting of the district directors Monday night. Mrs. Jessie Faye Morris will come from Fossil with 20 years teaching experience for an elementary position and Stephen K. Hillis of Forest Grove will take a position as speech and English teacher at Ione.

Hillis has no teaching experience, but because of his work in speech correction, it is expected that a small amount of released time can be given by the new instructor to the continuation of the district's speech correction program.

Supt. David Potter said that 10 teaching positions remain to be filled for the next school year—two at A. C. Houghton school, Irrigon; two at Ione High; one at Heppner Elementary; two at Heppner High; and two at Ione Elementary.

At the meeting the board approved a motion to apply for participation in the Oregon Small High School Improvement project. In doing so, the district agrees to send representatives to regional conferences, do everything possible to expedite self-evaluation programs in the schools, make resources available for experimental programs, and allow some released time for teachers to participate in the improvement projects.

Supt. Potter announced a meeting called by the State Department at Condon April 14 for the purpose of working out plans for joint use of services in four counties. He said, however, that his feeling is to continue the two-county relationship in district 8 with Umatilla county, which has been very satisfactory. The four counties considered for the plan include Sherman, Gilliam, Wheeler and Morrow. He indicated that the county would not be represented at the meeting.
