

Mustangs Win Two, Lose Three on Diamond

Up against tough pitching Heppner High's baseball team lost three of its five ball games during the week. The Mustangs topped the Condon Blue Devils in two games, taking a 17-7 victory last Tuesday here, and then traveling to Condon to win a 9-7 extra inning affair.

Heppner played host to Sherman High Saturday in their Greater Oregon League opener and suffered a 1-0 setback. Hermiston came to Heppner in a makeup doubleheader and took both ends, 2-1 and 3-1.

Exploding for a big 10-run first inning that saw every man in the Heppner lineup score in the first Condon game, the Mustangs kept adding runs to take the victory. Heppner collected the 10 runs on three hits, four walks, and four errors. The Blue Devils outlit the Mustang 11 to seven but Heppner took advantage of seven Condon errors to win. Thursday the Mustangs found themselves up against a much improved Condon team and it took nine innings before Heppner could pull out the game. The Mustang team drew first blood when Stu Dick banged a single and then scored on Don Munkers' one-bagger. The Blue Devils came right back to score three runs in the second frame, cashing in on one hit and three Heppner miscues. The Mustangs tied things up at 3-3 with a single tally in the third and the game stayed that way until the sixth when Condon went in front, 7-6.

With two outs in the top of the seventh, Dennis O'Donnell stepped up to pinch hit and scored Carl Bauman on an infield single. The Mustangs scored two more in the ninth and held off the Condon club for the win. Carl Bauman went the route for Heppner as he took his third win without a loss.

Saturday's league opener was a well played ball game but errors hurt the Mustangs as pitcher Bill Snyder allowed the Huskies only three hits. Pitcher

Owens of Sherman fired one-hit ball at the Mustangs but that one hit, a triple by Jim Doherty, almost saved the contest. Sherman got its single run in the last inning when the lead-off man hit a long fly that the centerfielder dropped. He was later put out at second but that one error opened the gate for the only run.

Playing without three senior regulars, the Mustangs dropped the twin bill with the Bulldogs here Tuesday. Hermiston used six pitchers in the two five-inning contests. In the opener, Heppner got its only run in the third and the Bulldogs got their two tallies in the same inning. In the second game, Hermiston got its first run in the second but the Mustangs bounced back to tie it up in the same inning. The Bulldogs cinched it with two more tallies in the third and the Mustangs couldn't get any more runs. Bauman suffered his first setback in four starts.

Hilanders Claim Trophy At Invitational Track Meet

Setting four new meet records and taking six first places, the Burns High Hilanders took first place and the rotating trophy as they claimed it for the third time in succession at the Heppner Invitational Track Meet held in Heppner Saturday.

Thirteen schools attended, coming from as far as Portland (Columbia Christian) and Woodburn (MacLaren). Burns amassed 141 points in the meet, the only team to break the century mark. MacLaren was second with 92.

Nine new marks were set, with the Hilanders getting four of them. Wahtonka had three new records and Franklin of MacLaren set the other two marks with a fast time of 10.0 in the 100-yard dash and 23.1 in the 220.

Heppner spikers did not get any firsts but the Mustangs had two seconds, one by Tim Driscoll in the 440 and the other by John Wagenblast in the 880.

Established and five-digit numbers have been assigned to 553 sectional centers within 10 zones. The first three numbers designate a specific sectional center, and the first of the three designates the major zone involved. Heppner is in zone 9. The last two numbers of the five tell the independent delivery station.

Establishment of the new star route from Pendleton to Kinzua as of July 1, 1965, is a specific extension of the Zip Code concept which will place mail from this area more rapidly into the main flow of mail, Postmaster Driscoll said.

As a part of his program, he discussed a film showing how 73 billion pieces of mail are handled by the postal department annually in the United States.
