

Service for Ezra Adkins Held in Kinzua on April 19

KINZUA — Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 p.m. in the Kinzua Community church for Ezra Wilbur Adkins, 72, who had passed away April 16 at Redmond.

Mr. Adkins was born August 18, 1892, at Hardman, and had lived his entire life in this area. Ezra or "Grandad" as he was known, was a veteran of World War I. He came to Kinzua in 1929 and worked for Kinzua Pine Mills until his retirement in 1957. He had remained since in Kinzua until recently when his trailer had burned and he had gone to Redmond to live.

He is survived by his wife Julia of Kennewick, Wash., a son, James of Mt. Vernon, Oregon, and three granddaughters: Frennie Silvey of Prairie City and Arleta Silvey of Mt. Vernon; two foster sons, Zolton of Redmond and Lloyd Fones of Burns, nine grandchildren, Dixie Sargent of John Day, Ona Sargent of Kinzua, James and Wilbur Roach of Mt. Vernon, Rozanne Hawkins of Kennewick, Ernie, Ted, Ed, Irene Silvey of Mt. Vernon, seven great grandchildren and a host of other relatives and friends.
